

BURGLARS DIG THROUGH WALL TO ENTER STORE

Harlem Tailor, Called By Alarm, Sees Man Inside, but Finds Door Chained.

Burglars who possessed not only industry but pride of profession that led them to do something different from the usual grind of their fellows, early today raided the tailoring establishment of Jacob Blum at No. 243 West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street. They got several hundred dollars worth of goods and left a peculiar tool and weapon behind them.

This combination article was a heavy door. The top of it was equipped with a heavy iron knob, useful for breaking either a door or a head. The other end terminated in a huge spike. Evidently the burglars had used this spike to dig a hole through the east brick wall of the store, spurring the ordinary process of wrenching or cutting the iron bars of the window.

TRAIN WRECKERS KILL TWO, DERAIL CARS.

Engineer and Fireman Lose Lives in Plot to Smash Michigan Central in Ontario.

DETROIT, Mich., May 31.—Train wreckers are blamed by the Michigan Central Railroad officials for the wrecking early today of westbound passenger train No. 9 a mile east of Ridgeway, Ont.

Engineer Quinn and Fireman Oakes were killed under their overturned locomotive. No passengers were injured, according to the official railroad report, as the passenger coaches remained on the track, but the baggage cars were derailed.

An examination of the track indicated that spikes and splinters had been removed in a deliberate plan of train wrecking. The headquarters of a section crew nearby had been broken open and the absence of a steel bar and a wrench disclosed the source of the tools with which the work had been done.

NAT GOODWIN WANTS THAT TRUST FUND BACK.

LOS ANGELES, May 31.—Nat Goodwin has decided, according to a report he will not deny, that he will endeavor to regain possession of \$500,000 worth of property in California in which Edna Goodrich was given an interest before she married him. Friends of the actor say he has been advised that the lawyer in England who drew the trust agreement by making it extend beyond the lives of the principals wrote into it a provision that, while legal in England, is not valid in California.

HELD AS BIGAMIST FOR ELOPING WITH PARALYZED GIRL

Yonkers Man Carried Crippled Young Woman in His Arms to Waiting Auto.

Mrs. Charles H. Roth, wife of a grocer, of No. 230 Valley avenue, Yonkers, went to New Haven today to lay a charge of bigamy against her husband, whom she accuses of stopping from Frederick with Miss Clara Riske, twenty-six years old, of No. 178 Linden street, Yonkers, a cripple. It is alleged that Roth carried the girl, who cannot walk, to an automobile in his arms.

Miss Riske's legs are paralyzed, and she has to be taken about in an invalid's chair. Mrs. Roth, who is a pretty woman of thirty, told the police that her husband, a man of forty, left home on Monday and that she had received information that he married Miss Riske at Grace Episcopal Church, New Haven.

He said gossip had for some time spoken of her husband and the crippled girl because he frequently took her for rides in his automobile. The police communicated with the authorities in New Haven and Roth was found last night at No. 397 Elm street.

The police say he admits he married Miss Riske and that he has another wife, but is silent as to why he eloped. Miss Riske was ill about three weeks ago and went to Peekskill to visit friends. Her parents failed to get their usual letter on Monday and went to Peekskill, where they were told the girl had been carried off in an automobile only a short time ago by Roth, and that they had left for New Haven to be married. Not knowing that Roth was married, Miss Riske's friends offered no objection.

It was through the girl's parents that Mrs. Roth learned of the affair. Miss Riske knew Roth was married. It is probable he will be tried at New Haven.
