Commissioner Waldo's report to the Mayor follows: Hon. William J. Gaynor, Mayor, City of New York.

Sir—In compliance with your letter of July 12 I caused a thorough investigation to be made of conditions affecting the delivery of ice in this city.

This department has interviewed 420 independent ice dealers, of which 222 complained against general conditions, and thirty-eight have agreed to submit sworn affidavits, which will be forwarded to the District Attorney and to the Attorney-General of the State as soon as prepared.

A copy of the letter from President Oler is attached hereto. ICE IN PLENTY STORED IN DEPOTS AT HUDSON.

From investigation by this department the amount of ice stored in the ice houses along the upper Hudson appears to be plentiful. Reports from investigators of this department from the ice district state that the Knickerbocker Ice Company has more than 200,000 tons in storage on the Hudson River.



CHOLERA DANGER CAUSES GOV. DIX TO DEMAND REPORT

who showed symptoms of cholera yesterday removed to Swinburne Island. All were among the Motika's passengers.

Three cholera suspects taken off the Anchor liner Perugia, from Naples Saturday, were said to-day at Swinburne Island to be convalescent. The Perugia's other passengers are on Hoffman Island.

Charles Dushkind, the lawyer who is pushing the investigation of conditions at the Quarantine Station ordered by Gov. Dix, declared to-day that practically all of the cases of cholera which have developed on Hoffman Island since the arrival of the Motika on July 5 were contracted by the victims on the island itself.

It is an established medical fact that cholera germs can only be introduced into the body by means of the mouth.

It is established that a contaminated water cistern was discovered on the island of Hoffman on Saturday. The bulk of those now suffering from this dread disease contracted it by drinking water from that polluted cistern.

Dr. Doty himself says that Cushing, the discharged laborer who died from cholera on Staten Island on Saturday, did not come into direct contact with any cholera patients or suspects.

BOSTON, Mass., July 17.—Dr. Samuel H. Durkin, chairman of the Boston Board of Health, took drastic steps to-day to prevent the invasion of cholera by announcement that all New York trains would be inspected by health inspectors and that every ship entering the port would be given rigid examinations at a quarantine.

AUBURN, N. Y., July 17.—The cholera quarantine which has been in force here since the death of Tommaso Biardi, an immigrant from the steamer Duca degli Abruzzi, on July 1, was officially declared off to-day and no secondary cases are now anticipated.

VIENNA, July 17.—Alarmed by the increase of cholera in Italy, the Austrian Government to-day issued supplementary quarantine instructions of the most rigorous character along the frontier to prevent the epidemic from spreading to Austria or Hungary.
