

SACRIFICES LIFE TO SAVE GRANDSON FROM AUTO'S PATH

Mrs. Costello Pushes Boy to Safety, But Is Crushed Under Big Car.

CHAUFFEUR ARRESTED. Drives His Auto Into "L" Pillar Trying to Avoid Hitting the Woman.

In a desperate and successful attempt to save her little grandson from being knocked down and ground under the wheels of a heavy automobile, Mrs. Mary Costello, aged sixty-five, of No. 48 West Thirty-seventh street, lost her own life last night.

At the same time a heavy ton car, owned by P. D. Wagoner, a real estate man, of No. 27 Riverside Drive, came out of the shadow of the elevated railroad, going north.

As she reached the northbound track she caught sight of the automobile coming toward her with terrific speed. She shrieked with fright, but had presence of mind enough to thrust George forward out of harm's way.

Chauffeur Freeman saw the old woman and the boy just as they crossed his machine's path. He fairly lifted himself out of his seat as he twisted his wheel to make a quick turn to pass them by, but the distance was too short.

CHAUFFEUR DROVE AWAY AFTER HIS CAR BADLY INJURED MAN.

A fugitive chauffeur, who left an injured man in the street while he ate up the roads in an effort to put the longest possible distance between himself and his victim, was arraigned in the Harlem Police Court today.

Lamberton's slight wound up in a ditch at Jerome avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, where he was found by detectives who had trailed him from Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street by means of the license number of his car, "60,998, N. Y."

Although the car didn't stop, Policemen Fitzmorris and the men had a good look at her, and they all agreed on her license number. Detectives piled on to an Eighth avenue car and rode to Huber's roadhouse at One Hundred and Sixty-third street without getting any sight of the offending automobile.

Here another chauffeur placed his car at their disposal, and the men on the road at the rate of a mile a minute. Pretty soon they came across the ditched car. Lamberton was standing near by.

"You're the man we want," they informed him. Lamberton didn't know why he was wanted, and even when they told him, kept insisting that they were wrong and that his arrest was an outrage.

BLAZING YACHT'S SEVEN FISHERMEN SAVED BY DIVING

Owner Bishop's Command to Desert Motorboat Averts a Tragedy.

(Special to The Evening World.) WESTHAMPTON, Aug. 18.—Seven members of a fishing party had a narrow escape from death early today, when a gasoline stove upset, firing the motor yacht Bilpha, owned by Gaston Bishop of this place.

Preparing breakfast in the heavy sea stirred up by a westerly gale the stove was overturned, and a trail of flame ran toward the yacht's fuel tank. Mr. Bishop shouted, "All overboard!" and prompt obedience to the command saved his companions.

Life savers from Point of Woods Station rowed to the scene and picked up the swimmers, and succeeded in beaching what was left of the yacht's hull.

RUNAWAY GIRLS FOUND BY FATHER AT NIAGARA FALLS

Gone From Rye a Week, They Reveal Identity When Money Is Gone.

Annie and Gertrude, the pretty young daughters of Fritz Niedringhaus, a hotel keeper of Rye Beach, who disappeared August 11, are back home. Their father brought them down from Niagara Falls today and is so glad to find them safe and sound—and unmarried—that nothing but joy reigns in the Niedringhaus family.

It was thought at first that her admirer and another youth had struck out for other scenes at the same time, but the youths proved an alibi by being found at home. A widespread alarm was sent out for the girls and the parents were in a pitiable state of anxiety until Wednesday, when they got a telegram from the police authorities of Niagara Falls stating that Annie and Gertrude were there and anxious to return home.

CAR WITH GREEN MOTORMAN CRASHES INTO A TRUCK.

Several Persons Are Slightly Injured and the New Hand Disappears.

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SHAKE-UP BY TAFT OVER THE CHARGES AGAINST DR. WILEY

President Will Take Action in Pure Food Snarl When Congress Adjourns.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—President Taft does not expect to settle the Wiley case before the adjournment of the present session of Congress. The closing days of the session have presented to him so many important matters that the President has been unable to take up the case in detail.

He intends to read all the testimony offered before the House Committee, which is investigating the Department of Agriculture, and any other information bearing on the case which is available. That there may be some criticism of officials of the department other than Dr. Wiley is the belief here today, although the President has spent but little time in discussion of the whole affair.

Dr. Wiley, who made the request for the records, explained that they were official printed regulations and decisions which had later been withdrawn and changed after the collection of the food manufacturers had protested against them.

Asked what Solicitor McCabe had to do with deciding what was whiskey, Dr. Wiley said: "I would rather let him state."

Dr. Wiley said two of his reports on these investigations had not been published.

Dr. Wiley said he told Secretary of Agriculture Wilson all about the proposed employment of Dr. H. H. Rusby of New York.

After the Secretary had approved, Dr. Wiley told of signing out that \$2,000 was too much for Dr. Rusby and of having the Secretary reduce it to \$1,000. Again he denied that anything was said about Dr. Rusby working only eight days a year as he presented the matter to Secretary Wilson.

GEBHARDT'S WILL IS CONTESTED BY SHOW GIRL WIFE

Former Marie Wilson Declares Clubman Made Later Disposal of Estate.

Mrs. Marie Gebhardt, widow of the late Frederick Gebhardt, who died Sept. 3, 1910, through her attorneys, Osborne, Lamb & Garvan, of No. 115 Broadway, today filed a complaint with the County Clerk, asking that the will of Gebhardt, which was dated June 23, 1908, and was admitted to probate a few weeks after his death, be set aside on the ground that it was not the last will of Gebhardt.

The will left his entire estate to Mary I. Nelson, Isabelle Nunnewell and Jules Blanc Nelson, and no mention was made of his wife, although it was said that Mrs. Gebhardt was at the deathbed of her husband.

Marie Wilson, of the original "Florodora" sextet, was Gebhardt's second wife, and they kept their marriage a secret for a year. Three years before he died his wife left him, but when it became plain that he could not live she came on from Washington, where she was living, to nurse him.

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

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
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
