TAKES DEAD CHILD TO MANY DOCTORS, HOPING TO SAVE IT

Mrs. Esther Grossfield Refuses to Believe That Bella's Life Is Gone.

CROWD FOLLOWS HER.

Little Girl Suffers Attack of Meningitis While at Play in Brooklyn.

Mrs. Esther Grossfield of No. 465 Glenmore avenue, Brooklyn, ran frantically about the streets near her home to-day bearing the body of her little child Bella.

Crowds followed her in the street. Sympathetic men paused to take a glance at the slight little figure the woman bore.

SITS ON THE STOOP STILL CLINGING TO THE DEAD CHILD.

There, sitting upon the front stoop, she still clung to the little girl's body, rubbing its hands and temples and begging the closed eyes to open.

"Oh, no, she is not dead, she is not dead," cried the mother.

Then the coroner's office was notified. Little Bella was seven years of age. She was romping and playing in the street in front of her home shortly before noon when a pain attacked her.

"The little girl died of a sudden attack of spinal meningitis," he said.

"Send for a doctor," she said. "I am very ill and I think that I will die."

The mother seized the child in her arms and began her mad race through the streets.



He direct examination of her in such event would be able practically to fashion her testimony to suit their own case.

Wendenburg declared that possibly both the rebuttal by the prosecution and the rebuttal by the defense would be concluded to-day, and that the argument concerning instructions to the jury, to be followed by the argument of counsel proper might be begun to-morrow.

Beattie at 12:30 o'clock to-day again took the stand and Prosecutor L. O. Wendenburg resumed his cross-examination, court convening at an earlier hour than usual so as to complete the prisoner's testimony to-day.

"Well, I am pretty well satisfied with it so far," said the young man. "I believe my story is having a good effect on the jury. I am sure that when I finish they will be convinced of my innocence. No cross-examination can shake me."

Before the cross-examination was resumed Judge Watson announced that he would call the case at 11 o'clock and his main lines had been developed fully and at great length and had reached the stage where the court would be justified in placing some limit on counsel.

He added that owing to the two and a half hours of direct examination and cross-examination of the case at a half hour yesterday the examination of the prisoner should not be a test of physical endurance and that the court would permit an hour more of cross-examination and only a half hour of redirect examination.

Wendenburg said he only intended to ask one or two questions.

"Mr. Beattie," he began, "will you explain how the same gun which your cousin bought on Saturday night was in the woods on the Middletown Turnpike that night?"

"I didn't know anything about the gun. I didn't see it till the highwayman raised it."

"And will you admit that if your wife hadn't suggested the ride you wouldn't have been there?"

"No. My mind wasn't made up as to the ride when my wife suggested it."

BEATIE DISMISSED FROM THE STAND.

Well, how did the man with the gun know that you and your wife were going up the road that night?"

"We protest," said counsel for the defense, and the judge sustained them.

Mr. Wendenburg here concluded his cross-examination.

Lawyer Smith, for the defense, said no redirect examination was intended, and the prisoner was excused at 9:37 o'clock. Just seven minutes after he took the stand.

A cheering crowd was in the courtroom on account of the early hour.

Paul Beattie, cousin of the accused, was brought to the vicinity of the courthouse by the prosecution, and Mr. Wendenburg said he intended to put him on the stand in rebuttal.

Harry Latham was the first witness called by the prosecution in rebuttal.

Latham was alleged to have stated that while with the prisoner preceding the murder, Beattie immediately after leaving a telephone said he was going to Short and Main streets in Richmond.

Paul Beattie had testified that he met Henry on Thursday night at this intersection. The prosecution attempted to show the telephone conversation concerning the alleged meeting.

In his testimony, however, Latham maintained that all he knew was that Beattie had mentioned going to Short and Main streets. He knew nothing as to the new telephone conversation or who the accused intended to meet at the corner.

"WILL BE THERE IN FIFTEEN MINUTES," SAID BEATIE.

W. R. Hart, who was with Latham, was called. He said he had been a friend of the accused for fifteen years. On the Thursday night preceding the murder Hart said he overheard Beattie say on the telephone, "Will be there in fifteen minutes," and that when he came from the phone the accused explained to
