

FLIGHT IN A TAXI ADDS MYSTERY TO RUBBISH SHOOTING

Tom Trimp, Accused of Killing Saloonkeeper, Apparently Had Vehicle in Waiting.

POLICE CAN'T FIND HIM.

Slain Man Is Said to Have Been Preparing to Sell Out and Leave City.

The utility of the taxicab as an adjunct to the escape of a murderer was illustrated again today when detectives learned that a taxicab was waiting in Thirty-ninth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, for Tom Trimp, the bartender who fled yesterday afternoon after shooting Charles Rubbish in the bar-room of the Hotel Charles at the northwest corner of Thirty-eighth street and Seventh avenue.

This development and the fact that Trimp has disappeared absolutely—although his habits of life and the places he frequented are well known—leads the police to believe that Rubbish was murdered in the pursuance of a plot either to conceal from him the loss of money he had entrusted to another or to get control of money he had "planted" somewhere and was about to take into his own possession.

SAID TO HAVE PLANNED TO SELL OUT HIS BUSINESS.

Rubbish, it is now claimed, was the "bank roll guy" in the partnership between himself and "Skunk" Thomas, a Fenelon character, in the operation of the notorious Hotel Charles and a saloon at the corner of Thirty-sixth street, two blocks below in Seventh avenue. Friends of Rubbish say he was getting ready to sell out his interest in the two places and go to the Pacific Coast to marry a vaudeville performer named Ida Barr.

I am glad you are going so well out and get away from that place. It is no place for you and will kill you if you stay. Come out here and make a new start. "I'm going to cut out New York, go to Seattle and get married to Ida," an-

nounced Rubbish. "No more of this sporting life for me." At this moment Trimp called out from the barroom that somebody wanted to see Rubbish. The saloonkeeper stepped through the swinging doors into the barroom. Two shots were heard and he fell back through the door, breathing his last, with one bullet wound in his left temple and another in his left side near the heart.

LEAPS INTO A TAXICAB AND LEAVES NO TRAIL.

Trimp, throwing aside his apron and jacket, sped from the saloon up Seventh avenue, turned into Thirty-ninth street and jumped into the taxicab. He left no trail, although a pursuit was organized within a few minutes.

No one saw Trimp fire the shot. The revolver with which the killing was accomplished has not been found. The only evidence against Trimp is that he ran away. It would interest the detectives to know who planted the taxicab around the corner in Thirty-ninth street in front of old Soubrette Row to await the arrival of the fleeing Tom Trimp.

"Skunk" Thomas asserts that Rubbish was killed by mistake. "Thomas is out on bail, under charge of shooting and badly wounding a man named Boylan, said to be a gang leader in the Thomas & Rubbish saloon at Thirty-sixth street. "It wasn't Charlie they wanted," Thomas declared. "They were after me and got their signals mixed or something."

'LEXOW' BOARD STARTS HUNT FOR PHILADELPHIA GRAFT.

Trailing Mayor Reuburn Through Attack on City Departments—Republican Fight.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 7.—The "Lexow" or Philadelphia's municipal departments under Mayor Reuburn's administration was begun by the City Senatorial Commission in the City Hall today. Sitting on the Commission are State Senators Sterling Catlin, Chairman, of Wilkes-Barre; J. K. P. Hall, of Elk County, William McCann, of Northumberland and Frank E. Baldwin, of Potter County. State Senators James P. McInerney, who, with United States Senator Penrose, is fighting against Edwin H. and William S. Vare for the control of the local Republican organization is not sitting on the commission, although he is a member.

The opening gun was fired by Logan MacLachlan, counsel for the Thomas

M. Bullitt Taxpayers' Commission, who has been appointed a special deputy by Attorney-General John C. Bell. White will conduct the presentation of all evidence which Bullitt and his associates have gathered.

The first attack is being aimed at the Department of Public Safety and its director, Henry Clay, and is based on alleged irregularities in the ward contracts. Through Clay it is expected to strike at Mayor Reuburn. The latter and the Director of Public Safety are regarded as the strongest political allies the Vares have in their fight.

Boy Hurt by Percussion Cap. Edward Miles Jr., son of a contractor, who lives at No. 1523 Dean street, Brooklyn, found a box of percussion caps in his father's bureau drawer today and started to investigate them with a hammer. As he tried to drive one through the kitchen floor there was an explosion and the boy fell over unconscious, his face blackened by the powder. MILLIONS OF LAROUCHE DIVIDED AMONG FAMILY.

\$1,146,123 of Estate Is in Stocks and \$45,000 in Life Insurance Policies.

Joseph Laroque, who died June 7, 1908, left an estate that has been officially appraised at \$1,599,063.85. Members of his immediate family will divide the property under the terms of his will. Deputy Comptroller Julius Harbinger, today filed with the Surrogate, the appraiser's report.

Besides \$1,146,123 in stocks, the testator owned the residence at No. 6 East Fifty-sixth street, carried life insurance worth \$45,000 and held other interests.

Louise Roe, Elizabeth Roe and Cecelia Felle, three nieces, get \$10,000 each. Mrs. Annie S. Laroque, the widow, is given a life interest in the residence and in \$49,000. A fifth share in the home and a life interest in \$49,000 is given to Joseph Laroque, a son.

SUICIDE BY HANGING.

Unidentified Man Found in a Tree Near Broadway.

The screams of a woman attracted attention today on the elevated station of the Broadway branch of the subway at Two Hundred and Thirty-first street. She was pointing to the body of a man which swung from the limbs of a tree in a little clump of woods near Broadway, and twenty-five feet south of the station.

Lieut. James Kane cut the body down. The rope used for hanging the man was of the type that is utilized for tying bundles of newspapers.

There was every indication that the man was a suicide. No marks were found on the clothing by which identity could be established. Coroner Shonrut directed that the body be sent to the Morgue. The man was apparently forty-five years old, weighed 160 pounds and was five feet, seven inches tall. The eyes were blue, the hair and mustache light. The clothing was black and the hat
