

EDISON LIONIZED IN VIENNA; WILL CUT VISIT SHORT

"Haven't Come to Europe for Such Nonsense," He Says; Will Try to Escape.

NAME ON EVERY TONGUE

Likes Europe, but America Beats It in Architecture, Suburban Homes and Women.

VIENNA, Sept. 12.—Thomas A. Edison is hastening his departure from Austria owing to the excessive publicity it has been his effort to avoid since his arrival in Europe. Patient reporters, entertainment committees, photographers and street demonstrations have worried him. "Fleeting interviews in the local papers revive recollections of my former visit," he said, "while as a matter of fact, I was never here before."
"Vienna is a fine city. I like her open air and a relief from the cramped condition of American cities."
"The street paving is poor, the architecture is lacking in independent character and has no originality; there is no idea of modern comfort."
"I have come to the conclusion that America profits through the absence of such traditions. We take our cue from the requirements of the day and are not hindered by the ideas of the past. I believe the success of American architecture rests not on foreign schooling, but on what common-sense initiative and impulse creates."

"Why, sure; right here," replied the negro. "I'm a chauffeur."
"Then take me a spin round the park," said Bramble.
The negro leaned over to crank the engine. An explosion followed. Bramble was jerked out of his seat onto the pavement. The car burst into flame. The negro disappeared.
Herman Krauss of No. 222 Atlantic avenue, pushed the burning auto from in front of the garage, where a quantity of gasoline was stored. When firemen arrived nothing was left of the car but charred metal.
Bramble had his \$2,000 car exactly three hours.

Big Whaling Season.
NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Sept. 12.—The best summer season for whaling in a generation is indicated in despatches received by the New Bedford Board of Trade from Paval, Azores Islands. Nine vessels of a fleet that has reached Paval report 5,600 barrels of sperm oil. Besides that the brig Viola secured 110 pounds of ambergris, valued at \$50,000.

HELD FOR BIGAMY FOR WEDDING HIS WIFE'S NURSE

R. F. Martin of New York in Delaware Workhouse in Default of Bail.

WILMINGTON, Del., Sept. 12.—Robert F. Martin, a brick manufacturer, with an office at No. 26 Fifth avenue, New York, was in the New Castle County workhouse today, in default of \$1,000 bail, having been arraigned before Magistrate Lewis here late yesterday on a charge of bigamy. He was held for appearance at the September term of court.

Martin's wife, accompanied by a son, was at the hearing. She testified that her husband married Miss M. J. Zinn, a nurse of Allentown, Pa., whom she had engaged. The wedding, which took place here June 29 last year, was verified by the Rev. Dr. George L. Wolfe, the officiating minister, to whom Martin made the statement that he was unmarried.
Mrs. Martin told the Magistrate she had agreed to let her husband have a divorce because he loved another, and a referee had been appointed in New York to take testimony. He did not wait for the case to proceed, however, marrying the Allentown nurse in the mean time. Martin said he had no defense to offer. He was then committed. After the hearing his father, Robert C. Martin of New York, who refused to give his street address, reached the Magistrate's office and was much perturbed when he learned the case had ended. Both Martin and his father said they were unable to give bail. Wife No. 2 and her father were expected at court, but did not appear.

The maximum punishment for bigamy in Delaware is three years' imprisonment. Until recently it included a pillory sentence, but the pillory has now been abolished.
