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GOVERNORS TAKE A FIRM STAND ON LIABILITY LAWS

Favor Statute Requiring Employers to Compensate the Workmen for Injuries.

TO ACT AUTOMATICALLY Plan Nationwide Legislation Which Will Force Payment Without Lawsuits.

(Special from a Staff Correspondent of The Evening World.) SPRING LAKE, N. J., Sept. 12.—Before an audience that taxed the ballroom of the New Monmouth Hotel to its capacity the Governors' conference to-day took up for consideration the question of "employers' liability and compensation to workmen." Prominent men and women from the Jersey coast were present in astonishingly large numbers.

Twenty-eight Governors had places in the official circle. They followed with close attention the address of Gov. Eugene Foss of Massachusetts and Gov. Marion E. Hay of Washington, who led the discussion. Never since the issue of taking care of injured workmen was first broached in America has so important a gathering entered into so serious a consideration of the topic.

GOVERNOR ASSAILS WEDDINGS BANNED IN DIVORCE DECREE

Joseph M. Carey of Wyoming Declares That Such Marriages Are Illegal.
