

BURGLAR ALARM TRAPS BOY WHO'S DEAF AND DUMB

Rings for Half an Hour While He's in Cellar Under Pawnshop.

AROUSED NEIGHBORS.

He Doesn't Hear It, and Police Find Him Hiding Behind Barrel.

George Prayer of No. 385 Baltic street, Brooklyn, who says he is fifteen, but whose parents insist he is only fourteen, was arraigned in Children's Court today on a charge of juvenile delinquency. He was found in the cellar of David Harris's pawnshop at No. 223 Court street, Brooklyn, after a burglar alarm had been ringing for half an hour, arousing half the neighborhood.

When found by Policemen Foley and Lynch he was huddled up behind a barrel in the lighted cellar, hugging a punching bag. He had in his clothes \$2.15, fifteen keys, two knives, an open-ended metal watch, a gold-plated chain and a new gray cap.

When the policemen pulled him from behind the barrel and questioned him, they had the conversation entirely to themselves for some time. The coyness of George finally answered Foley. He demanded that if his conduct tallied at least he could make signs. Foley then began to make signs and had better results.

The boy let him know, by a few sentences with his fingers, that he was deaf and dumb and that all he meant to do in the cellar was to work his way to the upper floor to pawn the punching bag.

Foley explained to the boy that, as it was after cleaning time at the pawn shop, he had better bring the bag around to the Children's Society headquarters, in Southborough street.

Harris's clerk, Benjamin Bergman, called around at the society's rooms and looked over the contents of George's pockets. He said he had seen many of the articles in his employer's shop. In the cellar the police found a brace, two bits, a screwdriver, a hammer and a circular saw.

BOY FATALLY SHOT BY A POLICEMAN FIRING AT OTHERS

Bullet Intended for Men Who Had Taken Officer's Club Hits Bystander.

Paul Ajas, eighteen, of No. 228 West Twenty-seventh street, was in the vicinity of Seventh avenue and Twenty-seventh street last night when Patrolman Dugan of the Twentieth street station was chasing two men who had taken his club from him. Dugan drew his revolver and ordered the men to halt. Upon their failure to obey he fired one shot; it hit Ajas in the abdomen. The patrolman saw Ajas fall and went to his assistance. The victim, a cook, was taken to the New York hospital, where the doctors say he may die.

After seeing the wounded man taken care of Dugan reported the shooting at the station house and Detectives Scammon and Dennison went out to look for the men who had caused the disturbance.

They found the two in a saloon drinking a toast to their successful adventure. Taken to the station they gave their names as Harry Vidima, an embalmmer, No. 129 First avenue, and Gaston Ardite, No. 235 West Twenty-seventh street. Vidima was charged with assaulting an officer and Ardite with interfering with an officer.

Dugan said Vidima was drunk and was making a disturbance when told to move on. Vidima resented the interference and when Dugan attempted to arrest him and Ardite helped him attack the policeman.

WILLED \$23,000 TO CHARITY. Samuel Hall of Rye Left Estate Valued at \$114,000.

(Special to The Evening World.) MOUNT VERNON, N. Y., Sept. 18.—According to the report filed today in the surrogate's office by State Tax Transfer Tax Appraiser Clark, the late Samuel Hall of Rye, left an estate valued at \$114,000, of which \$23,000 goes to charity. He willed \$1,000 each to the following charitable institutions: The Industrial Alliance of New York City, the Corporation of the Memorial Baptist Church of Carlisle, Five Points' House of Industry, Presbyterian Hospital, Presbyterian Home for Aged Women, Board of Home Missions of the Presbyterian Church, Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute of Tuskegee, Alabama.

To the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church he left \$10,000, an d to the Board of Missions for Freedmen of the Presbyterian Church, \$5,000. The remainder of the estate was divided among five nieces.

Noted Church Organist Dead. One of New York's best known musicians and church organists, Henry B. Danford, is dead in the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. Watson Davis, No. 877 Lincoln road, Flatbush. He was seventy-three years old. He had been organist at St. Stephen's Church, St. George's church, and The Church of the Holy Innocents, and a teacher of the Frobenius House, at Peckskill and the Hamilton House at New Rochelle.

HISTORIC COLLEGE REOPENS.

St. Joseph's in Kentucky Once the Refuge for King Louis Philippe. BARTSTOWN, Ky., Sept. 13.—Historic St. Joseph's College, once a place of refuge for exiled King Louis Philippe of France abandoned as a seat of Catholic learning except for twenty years after the war, was reopened here last night with impressive ceremonies in which the Most Rev. Diomedo Falconio, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, participated. Bishop O'Donnoghue and Bishop Maes and numerous other Catholic clergy, as well as notable laymen, also had parts in the exercises.
