

JUDGE CONVICTS POLICEMAN IN HIS LETTER TO WALDO

Court Says Bluecoat Helped to Rob Russian Who Had Just Landed.

Judge Swann of the Court of General Sessions today forwarded to Police Commissioner Waldo, at the latter's request, the transcript of the testimony given at the trial of People vs. Horay, recently tried before him and a jury. Horay was convicted of grand larceny in the second degree for robbing a Russian by the name of John Kondratuk of 228. Policeman Ruben R. Huntington of the Union Market police station was jointly indicted with Horay and is now on trial before Deputy Commissioner Dillon at Police Headquarters for participation in the crime. In his letter to Commissioner Waldo Judge Swann says: "You will observe from the evidence in the case that one defendant could not be guilty unless the other defendant was also guilty. It also shows that the victim of the larceny had only been in New York one day before he was despoiled of his money and therefore he had no opportunity to form a prejudice against the police of this city, or against Huntington in particular. He made a mental note of the number on the officer's hat and that number was Huntington's official number. He picked out Huntington as the man when Huntington was presented in citizen's clothes, together with others before him. NEW CITY CHARTER MAY BE SHUNTED BY DEMOCRATS

Canvass at Albany Shows It Has No Chance to Pass on Present Vote.

ALBANY, Sept. 28.—In a final effort to force the passage of the New York Charter through the Legislature the Democratic leaders today began missionary work among the insurgent legislators, but without much result. It is thought that the charter will be abandoned and the work of the session devoted to the passage of the reappointment and appropriation bills. The Assembly leaders called a conference of the Democratic members and each gave his views on the charter. The sentiment showed that the required seventy-six votes cannot be secured. In the Senate, Senator Thomas Cullen, who has had charge of the charter, began his missionary work today. About ten Democratic Senators are against the bill. The protest of the New York City Board of Estimate against the charter was received and read in the Senate today. Majority Leader Smith and Assemblyman Foley had a conference in New York City last night with Leader Murphy, but returned without any orders other than that they were on the ground and to do the best they could.

POSTAL EMPLOYEES JAILED.

Carrier Gets a Year, Laborer Ten Months for Theft From Mail.

Two dishonest Postal Department employees were sentenced, one to a year and the other to ten months in prison, for stealing letters from the mails, by Judge Hough in the United States Circuit Court today. The heavier sentence was imposed upon Joseph P. Thompson, a negro, who while employed as a letter carrier in the Hudson Terminal branch office, stole a letter containing \$25. Thompson was arrested three months ago and has been in the Tombs ever since. Joseph Bekert, who received the ten months, was a laborer in the General Post-Office. He was detected two months ago stealing a letter that contained a dollar watch and a dollar bill.

BLAZE ON BOSTON LINE.

Firemen Struggle an Hour to Subdue Flames on the Bunker Hill.

Heat from the fire boxes in the engine room of the Maine Steamship Company's liner Bunker Hill started a blaze in a pile of waste today that burned fiercely for more than an hour. The Bunker Hill, which plies between New York and Boston, was moored at pier No. 12, at the foot of Barclay street, preparatory to sailing this afternoon. The engine and fire rooms are surrounded by a wall of sheet steel, and when the firemen, under Deputy Chief Blinn, arrived they were forced to fight the flames through a small aperture, scarcely large enough to admit of the passage of a man's body. When the blaze was discovered by Overlooker W. Gatter, fire coats were summoned, but they could not reach the blaze. Chief Engineer Herbert Vande and the crew fought the fire for a time, but finally were forced to call the city department. The Bunker Hill is the sister ship of the Massachusetts. She is of 2,000 tons register and of the twin screw type. Shadow Dances Barred. Chief Wallace of the Bureau of Licenses has put a ban on "shadow" or "color" dances in dance halls in the greater city. He sent notice to that effect to the five hundred licensed dance halls in the city. Tough dances are also to be taboed.

SIX MONTHS FOR JEWELLER WHO STOLE TO FEED FAMILY.

Judge Foster Tells Man He Shouldn't Have Children if He Can't Support Them.

Judge Foster in General Sessions today judicially knocked the props from under the Roosevelt large family idea when he told a prisoner that a man who could not take care of children recently had no business having them. Harry Zeedman, a jeweller, had lost his business in New Haven, been evicted from his home and was in New York without funds. He had a wife and a little child. He got a job with Boston Whitebook, a manufacturing jeweller of No. 94 Second street. After two days he asked for an advance on his pay. The house refused, and while other employees were at lunch, Zeedman stole twenty-two gold rings worth \$75, pawned them for \$30 and gave his wife the money. She was in court in-day to plead for him. Judge Foster said to him: "If a man cannot rear children decently he has no right to have them. You have been guilty of a crime and the law must impose some punishment." Then he sent Zeedman to prison for six months.
