

STRENGTH OF WARRING NATIONS

ITALY. NAVY—Fifteen battleships. Nine armored cruisers. Seventeen unarmored cruisers. Twelve fast merchant steamships. Three six destroyers. Thirty-six torpedo boats. Twenty-two submarines. Men—31,000. ARMY—Present strength, 250,000 men. Reserves, 500,000 men.

Grand Visier in succession to Hakkı Bey. Public indignation has been intense since the Italian demands were made known yesterday. The Italian Charge called the ultimatum at the usual weekly reception to the foreign representatives at the Foreign Office.

A news despatch received here this morning from Tripoli says that the last remaining Italian vessels to be recalled from the harbor of Tripoli are the steamers Adria and Ercolie. The Nav. Rossetti, the Apostolic Prefect, and the manager of the Banca di Roma asked permission of the Italian Consul to remain, but they were advised to leave.

Italy Follows Japan's Example; Surprised World by Starting War.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Persons familiar with the conditions leading up to the war between Japan and Russia recall that Japan took the course which is now being followed by Italy in practically beginning hostilities without warning to her powerful opponent and thereby securing a tremendous advantage from a naval point of view by preventing the consolidation of the two sections of the Russian fleet, which were lying in the harbors of Port Arthur and Chesilup, Korea.

Turks in United States May Be Called for War.

Four hundred thousand citizens of the Ottoman Empire who are living in the United States may be called upon to furnish an army of fighting men to take the field against the Italians, according to a declaration to-day by Dgial Bey, the Turkish Consul-General here.

TROOPS FIRE ON ANTI-WAR MOB.

ROME, Sept. 28 (via Modane, France). —Three persons have been killed and many wounded at Parma as the result of the anti-war demonstrations which are growing in force throughout Italy. A procession of workmen, carrying banners bearing anti-war sentiments, attempted to block the passage of a regiment of reserves en route to the barracks. The demonstration was peaceful, but the officer commanding the troops drew his men across the street and ordered them to fire.

WAR TROUBLE OF LONG STANDING.

The trouble between Turkey and Italy, which culminated this afternoon in a declaration of war at Rome, dates back to 1878, when with the making of the treaty concluding the Russo-Turkish war the powers are understood to have agreed to permit Italy a "pacific penet-

HORTON TO FIGHT \$150,000 SUIT FOR REFUSING TO WED

"Lillie d'Angelo" Bergh, 43, Says 78-Year-Old Wall Street Broker Jilted Her.

SHE IS A "CHEVALIERE."

Big Financial Men Interested in Action Over Only Promise "Uncle Harry" Ever Broke.

"Uncle Harry" Horton, dean of Wall street, will fight the claim made against him by Miss Elizabeth P. Bergh for \$150,000 damages for breach of promise to marry her. The head of the banking house of H. L. Horton & Co. on No. 60 Broadway would not talk about the case himself, but his wife, who is the claimant, said that she would not be accepted at his face value.

But the friend, who later talked of the case, was much more fluent. He said: "Mr. Horton has known this woman for a number of years and she hasn't a letter, a scrap of evidence or a conversation that would compromise him in any way. This suit is a blow at his health and a blow at his reputation, as he sees it. I happen to know that an offer has been made to compromise the case out of court for a small cash payment, and I should know that 'Uncle Harry' won't make any such compromise.

SHE SAID HE WANTED DOWRY, BUT HE'S RICH.

"The part of her complaint which is stricken from the record by the court order and which stated that he had promised to marry her as soon as certain humiliating conditions were removed, referred to her claim that he insisted upon the payment of a dowry before he would marry her. Mr. Horton is rich. It is absurd to think of his demanding a dowry from any woman."

DAUGHTERS AND NURSE OPPOSED THE MATCH.

"The daughters objected to the match. Another woman, a nurse named Sarah Payne, who has long been in the family a long time, also objected to Harry's marriage, and she was the most active factor in preventing it.

WAR NEWS HURTS STOCKS IN LONDON.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—The stock market was depressed today on reports that Turkey would resist the Italian proposal of occupation of Tripoli. Turkish bonds fell 1 point and Italian securities 1 point on the opening, while American shares opened from 1-4 to 1-2 lower in sympathy. A later rally was followed by a sharp reaction. At noon the tone was weak with prices 1-4 to 2 points below yesterday's New York closing.

CHIASO, Switzerland, Sept. 28.—The Albanians are petitioning Gen. Garibaldi to take advantage of the situation and organize another Albanian revolt in Turkey.

Villard, Hon. Pleasant Porter of Indian Territory, Countess Donoghmore of England, Prof. Henry Fairfield Osborn of Columbia, the widow of Jefferson Davis and many noted opera stars and actors, such as Patti, Soubirch, Rosina Laborde, Calve's teacher, and Calve herself. According to the circular, Soubirch said Miss Bergh implanted the "forgotten art of bel canto" in her pupils.

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BANKER GAMBIER WANTS TO DIVORCE "KISSLESS BRIDE"

Asks Court to Dismiss Suit He Brought to Annul the Marriage.

Edward Victor Gambier, cashier of the Merchants' Exchange National Bank, in the Supreme Court to-day asked Justice Pendleton to discontinue the suit he brought to annul his marriage to Edith May Russell Gambier, the "kissless bride."

Gambier declared in his petition that he had been "advised of sufficient evidence" upon which to obtain an absolute divorce, but failed to state the nature of the evidence.

KISSLESS BRIDE'S SEPARATION SUIT WAS DISMISSED BY COURT.

Justice Pendleton reserved decision, but said he was powerless to direct a plaintiff to go to trial with his suit when he petitioned the court to discontinue.

STRAUS WANTS WASHINGTON TO ACT.

Oscar S. Straus, the former American Ambassador to Turkey, to-day sent a telegram to Secretary Knox at Washington, urging that the United States exercise its right under the Convention for the Pacific Settlement for International Disputes to preserve peace and prevent the war between the Mohammedan and Christian nations of the world.

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GIVES WIFE HER WAY AND ALL HIS WAGES.

And Will Let Her Get a Divorce if He Doesn't Live Up to His Word.

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—Edward Matt, who to-day married Miss Gertrude Ellis, sought to avoid future domestic ill-will by filing with the County Recorder a guarantee to her, namely, that the model husband as possible. The guarantee, signed and witnessed by a notary, promised:

"She may do as she pleases. "She is free to go and come when she likes, to go with whom she chooses, and I will not be jealous. "I will not interfere with any of her plans. "I will be kind and good to her. "I will give her all my earnings, and it will be her privilege to do with my income as she likes, so long as she feeds me well.
