

HELD AS ROBBER ON PALISADE CAR; FIGHTS POLICEMAN

Frank Hart Makes Desperate Dash for Liberty, but Is Quickly Overpowered.

FOUR MEN IN HOLD-UP.

One Who Was Shot With Bullet Intended for Conductor Prisoner in Hospital.

Frank Hart of No. 462 West Twenty-fifth street, under arrest charged with being concerned in an attempt last night to hold up a Palisades trolley car, tried to-day to break away from Policeman Van Keuren, to whom he was chained on a car bound for Hackensack. In his break for liberty Hart pulled the Policeman from his seat and along the floor of the car.

The fight lasted five minutes. Men and women left the car by the nearest door, yelling with fright. Van Keuren, with the aid of the motorman, at last overpowered the prisoner. Hart is now in the Hackensack jail. There is another man under arrest in the Erie-wood Hospital. He is E. J. Schwazke of Jersey City Heights. He was shot by a bullet meant for the conductor.

Hart was caught by Policeman Dalton early to-day on a trolley car. He escaped and was recaptured after a running fight through the woods. He was turning to shoot Dalton when the policeman knocked him senseless with a blow on the side of the head with a revolver barrel.

Dalton had been out all night with twenty-five others hunting for the highwaymen. He started from Fort Lee at 5 o'clock to go to Palisades over the line on which the hold-up had occurred. The car was stopped at the second station out of Fort Lee, in the woods, by Hart, who did not enter until he had looked all the passengers over suspiciously. Dalton was not in uniform. Hart took a seat near the door and Dalton walked over and said to him:

"I guess I want you, don't I?"

RECAPTURED AFTER A CHASE AND FIGHT IN WOODS.

The man attempted to jump out of the door, but Dalton caught him and alighted with his prisoner to take a car back to Fort Lee. Hart twisted away from him and ran into the woods. Dalton was able to catch up because his man was breaking a way for him through the underbrush and brambles. Dalton fired two shots in the air, but they seemed to make Hart travel faster. After about a hundred yards Hart turned and began tugging at a revolver in his hip pocket. Dalton promptly knocked him over and then dragged him back to the trolley line.

Earlier in the morning Dalton had arrested another man whom he found asleep in a doorway in Fort Lee Village. The prisoner had a hat over his eyes too big for him, one of the highwaymen had lost his hat in the scuffle on the car. Dalton wanted to take the large hat from Dalton to Fort Lee to try the robber's hat on him. But he met Chief of Police Norwain, who is also candidate for Mayor, on the road, and was ordered to turn his prisoner over to Norwain. The fellow didn't look like a hold-up man.

The hunt for the highwaymen began within ten minutes after the attack on the car. There were seventeen passengers in the car, half of them women. It was bound south. Four men stood on the rear platform with the conductor, Max Klinger, of No. 462 Eighth street, West New York. As the car was passing Oeth's Hotel, which is the last house in Fort Lee Village, one of the men yelled in his ear:

"Throw up your hands!"

WOUNDED BY BULLET INTENDED FOR CONDUCTOR.

Sonntag turned and found a revolver muzzle under his nose. He brushed it away. The man fired and Sonntag fell. The other three men jumped on Sonntag, who tried to get three bullets to stop the car short, and then began kicking and scratching, fighting tooth and nail. The motorman came running back with his controller handle, and the robbers jumped from the car, pausing on the edge of the woods to yell back that they would kill anybody who tried to follow them.

Sonntag, who had saved 40 of the Public Service Corporation's money, which he had in his pocket, had no ambition to follow them. He took the injured man to Palisades, from where he was sent to the Englewood hospital. He is in a serious condition.

Meantime the passengers in the car were in a state of wild panic. Women were calling on men to save them. Men

FOUGHT SHIP FIRE SEVEN DAYS AMID VOLCANO OF OIL

30,000 Cases of Naphtha Aboard Big Lyndhurst Then Blew Vessel Into Wreck.

CREW OF 30 ESCAPED.

Seaman Foley Tells Thrilling Story of Disaster Off South African Coast.

Walter James Foley, recently a gunner in Uncle Sam's navy, borrowed cash to-day when the Atlantic transport liner Minnewaska reached port so he could go to No. 26 Broadway and get 444 pounds due to him for service on the wrecked bark Lyndhurst. While he waited for his car the able seaman told how he and Robert Seymour, the only other American in the crew of thirty, escaped from the burning four-master of the Standard Oil fleet when she caught fire off the African coast, Aug. 24.

Foley was one of the turret men on the Alabama until an explosion blew off two of his fingers and he wasn't any more use behind the big gun. Then he retired to the merchant service. Here is the sailor's tale of the sea:

"Our vessel was of 2,000 tons and we had 30,000 cases of naphtha. Going down the African coast, I fell sick and they put me off at Durban. I got well and shipped on the Radiant, which was wrecked, and I was again left at Durban. Then along came the Lyndhurst again and I went back to her.

"We were going to Port Elizabeth when the ship struck on Bird Island. They told us in and we got right and sailed for Cape Town. We were 241 miles from Cape Town, out to sea, when fire broke out in the hold. You know that 30,000 cases of naphtha make no asbestos cargo in a case like that. The sea was running rough and we fought the fire for seven days. The hatches were battened down and we tried to flood the hold.

"Then, on Aug. 24 there came an explosion. The main hatch was lifted up to the main 't' gallant mast. Most of the men were forward and they were not hurt. The sea was running high. We put over the starboard boat and

were cursing and fighting among themselves in their panic. Residents of Palisades say that the raid is the result of the influence of Palisades Park, the summer amusement resort, against which they have been fighting for years. All sorts of tough people are attracted to the park and are tempted by the prosperous appearance of the homes and people and the excellent opportunities for crooked work to come back in the winter and make use of their information.

Hart had a preliminary examination before Justice J. H. Mannix in Fort Lee. Hart said that he had gone over from New York to visit a woman of fortune and that he carried a revolver habitually; he said that he felt one exploded cartridge in the weapon all the time in order to prevent an accidental discharge. The stains on his clothing came from the heating which Dalton gave him in making the arrest. He was held for the grand jury on the charge of carrying concealed weapons.

The conductor and motorman could not identify Hart as one of the men with whom they fought.
