RODGERS HEADS FOR TEXAS IN SEA-TO-SEA FLIGHT.

Aviator Flying Over Oklahoma Today Has Motor Trouble and Is Forced to Land for Repairs.

VINITA, Okla., Oct. 16.—Aviator C. P. Rodgers resumed his cross-continent flight at 7:40 A. M. to-day, after resting here over Sunday, with 1,531 miles of his journey from New York to his credit. He followed the tracks of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway, expecting to reach Fort Worth, Tex., 319 miles away, before dark. He planned to make his first stop at McAlester, Okla., 127 miles south.

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Oct. 16.—Aviator C. P. Rodgers, on his sea to sea flight reached Muskogee at 8:07 this morning. His motor was missing badly and he was obliged to alight. He made the distance of sixty-five miles from Vinita in one hour and fifteen minutes. Rodgers expected to resume his flight as soon as he made repairs.

REFUSE LOAN TO CHINA.

Foreign Bankers Decline to Advance \$2,000,000 for War.

PEKING, Oct. 14.—The Government appears to have sufficient ready money for a campaign of six weeks or two months, but anxious for a reserve fund in view of the possibility of a more extended conflict with the revolutionists, to-day applied formally for a loan of \$5,000,000 taels (about \$3,000,000) to the international bankers who arranged the \$50,000,000 currency reform loan.

The group of financiers who represent the four nations, the United States, Great Britain, Germany and France, were unable to agree to do this and the loan was refused.

Killed at Work in Brewery.


