

KISSES AND HUGS BY PSYCHIC GUIDE IN MAINE WOODS

Graham Had Happy Moments With Mrs. Ferguson, According to Witnesses.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Oct. 18.—Two Maine guides and a tutor to-day added more spice to the testimony in the divorce action brought here by Walter Ferguson Jr. against his wife, Annie Carstairs Ferguson, in which George Graham, the guide with psychic vision, is named as co-defendant.

Albert R. Owens of Greenville Junction, Me., was one of the witnesses whose depositions were read. Owens said that he was hired by Graham in 1906. He went to Camp Frances, the Ferguson camp at Moosehead Lake, and found the party had fourteen tents. The witness said Mrs. Ferguson and Graham, who was head guide, were very friendly. They went hunting and also took canoe trips together. In the evenings they sat together by a camp fire. Later in the summer Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson and Graham went to a separate camp. This was four miles away from the main party. The couple stayed several weeks in this lone camp and did not return to Camp Frances to sleep. In the summer of 1910 Owens was again engaged by Graham. One morning he was asked by Mrs. Ferguson to get some water for her bath. He returned with it and saw Graham in Mrs. Ferguson's tent. The guide had his arm about Mrs. Ferguson's waist and her head was upon his shoulder. Mrs. Ferguson was clad in a kimono.

Owens said something in order to attract their attention and then the couple changed position. At the time of the episode, Mrs. Ferguson was the only woman in camp, with the exception of a woman cook. There were several guides and the two Ferguson children. Shortly after the episode of the bath Owens said he was discharged by Graham.

The deposition of George Owens, brother of the previous witness, was then read. He was also a guide engaged for the Camp Frances party. In the summer of 1906 he observed nothing wrong about the relations of Mrs. Ferguson and Graham. They sat together in the evening and took canoe rides. In the summer of 1910 Owens saw Graham and Mrs. Ferguson hugging. They left camp once for two or three days, and subsequently Graham told the witness that he and Mrs. Ferguson had gone to Boston.

The witness declared Mrs. Ferguson had told him Graham had spiritualistic powers. He could tell what was going to happen. Owens said he received no pay for his services as a guide until about six months after he left the employ of the party. Then Mrs. Ferguson's lawyer paid him \$200.

Counsel for Ferguson then introduced the deposition of Walter Rideout, of Dover, Me. He is a student at Colby College. Rideout said he had been engaged by Mrs. Ferguson to act as tutor for Graham. She wanted the guide to teach the elementary branches of English, arithmetic and spelling. Rideout tutored the guide all summer for about three hours each morning.

TWO STREET CARS CRASH INTO TWO ICE WAGONS.


Rain Obscured the Vision of Two Motormen and Both Accidents Happened Within Six Minutes. Within six minutes of each other, two Fifth avenue street cars, Brooklyn, crashed into two ice wagons shortly after 5 o'clock this morning. Both accidents were caused by the rain and mist obscuring the glasses of the motorman's windows.

Car No. 714, northbound, in charge of Motorman Miller, hit a wagon belonging to Alexander Campbell, No. 81 Flatbush avenue, driven by George Stevens, twenty-one, of No. 964 Rogers avenue. The wagon was on the car tracks near Sixty-third street. Stevens was thrown out, but went home after Dr. Bennett of the Norwegian Hospital dressed his contusions.

A few minutes later car No. 754, southbound, two blocks distant from the scene of the first collision, hit a truck wagon owned by E. J. Haviland, Seventieth street and Eleventh avenue, Brooklyn, and driven by F. K. Deagan of No. 523 Third avenue. Deagan was not hurt. Both wagons were somewhat damaged.
