

**LOSES \$400,000
TO WED MAN SHE
LOVED AT SIGHT**

**Young German Girl Abandons
Aunt's Fortune and Marries
Los Angeles Youth.**

GALVESTON, Tex., Oct. 27.—Isabella Koeltz, a winsome girl of twenty years, gave up a fortune estimated to be worth about \$400,000 for the love of a young man she met while on her way from her home in Germany to join an aunt who had selected her as heir.

The aunt, Mrs. George Elsbarg, is a wealthy widow without children residing near Fredericksburg, Tex., and owns several farms and landed interests. She is seventy years old, and had selected her favorite niece, the youngest daughter of her sister, living near Hanover, Germany, as heir to her estate, and arrangements were made for the girl to come over and make her home with her wealthy relatives.

At Bremen the young heiress met and fell in love with Wendon Phillips, whose home is in Los Angeles, and who is employed in the real estate office of his father. It appeared to be love at first sight for both.

Upon reaching here it was found that the aunt seriously objected to the marriage. The niece and her fiance visited the aged lady and had a long interview, but she declared she would disown the girl and cut her off without a cent, but the heiress made the sacrifice and the ceremony was performed. The newly wedded couple took their departure for California without receiving the aunt's blessing.

**CONVICT KIDNAPPER OF
SCIMECA BOY IN 10 MINUTES.**
Maximum Penalty Is Fifty Years—
Father Paid \$1,700 for His
Child's Return.

It took a jury less than ten minutes to convict Pietro Palozzola yesterday of the charge of having kidnapped four-year-old Michele Scimeca, son of Dr. Mariano Scimeca, from in front of his father's home, No. 2 Prince street, June 21, 1911. The child whom Palozzola had stolen and for whose return the physician had paid \$1,700 ransom, was in court.

The maximum penalty is fifty years in State prison. There is another indictment against the kidnapper for carrying concealed weapons.



NO PRINCETON PREXY YET.
Gifts of \$187,730 Announced—Cleveland H. Dodge Retires as Trustee.

The annual fall meeting of the Board of Trustees of Princeton University was held in Princeton, N. J., yesterday. Contrary to expectations and rumors,

no successor to Gov. Woodrow Wilson as President was selected. The resignation of Cleveland H. Dodge, '78, a life member of the board since 1904, was presented because of ill health. The board accepted the resignation with regret. Gifts amounting to \$187,730 in cash and \$2,000 in securities were received.
