

# TWEET! TWE-E-ET! THIS CANARY WILL STAY HOME NOW

For Thousands Tried to Capture Him on First Flight to Freedom.

JUST OFF FIFTH AVENUE.

"Mickey the Unknown" Hero Who Returned Mrs. Bliss's Pet Bird.

The neighborhood of Washington Arch was still buzzing to-day over the sensation Mrs. Edward Bliss's canary bird caused in West Eighth street, off Fifth avenue, at dusk last evening. The Bliss family, which is literary, lives in the Hotel Marlton, last off Fifth avenue, on the second floor west. The canary, which was one of three kept in the same cage, got loose about 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The bird apparently did not realize what it meant to get away from a meal of wheat with a hard winter coming on and twittered his way out from window after window. He was seen by several of the hotel. Policeman Bill Atchison, the protector of the canary, was interested by the shouts of passing nurse girls. One or two motormen of trolley cars stopped to see what was wrong with the policeman. Several newsboys halted on their way. Not less than a thousand sojourners from the Brevoort Hotel and other places in which persons who have nothing else to do sit around, poured into the street.

Mr. Bliss, aided by his literary friend Arthur Roche, hung an extra brass cage by a string and swung it pendulum like, in hopes the bird would dive into it. Lisleward Stewart, at least it was so reported, sat on the rail of an iron fence across the street and chirped "peep-peep."

The bird flitted over to the Washington Square Home for Friendless Girls and tried two or three windows in vain. Here once were not out on the fire escapes. A lady with silvery corked shoes held half a loaf of bread out of the window and said "ant-tweet."

Traffic on Fifth avenue was blocked by the shutting off of cross-town lines. People danced on top of the stages. Everybody was yelling, "Catch the poor little thing! Catch him!" And the poor little thing, scalded by the shouted roars from below, was getting hysterical.

### CAVALIERI GETS DIVORCE AFTER CHANLER PAYS UP

Diva, for \$70,000, Secures French Court's Severance of Marriage to Chanler.

Robert W. Chanler, New York artist and millionaire, has made a settlement of \$70,000 on Lina Cavalieri, in return for which she has divorced him in the Paris courts and given up all her claims to his estate, according to Mrs. Jessie Baskerville, an intimate of Mrs. Cavalieri's, who has just arrived in New York, and is at the Metropolitan Opera-house apartments.

Mrs. Baskerville declined to-day to say where she got her information, but insists that it is absolutely correct. She says that Chanler had to come to cold cash before the fair prima donna would agree to abandon her claims to the large fund given her by Chanler by an ante-nuptial agreement.

The general agreement, says Mrs. Baskerville, was made when Oreste Cavalieri, the singer's brother, was in America. Chanler married Mrs. Cavalieri after being divorced by his first wife, who was Miss Alice Chamberlain, of Ired Hook, Dutchess County. He is a grandson of John Jacob Astor.
