

FEDERAL LAWYERS CLASH OVER SUIT OF TOBACCO TRUST

McReynolds Seeks to Withdraw Because of Difference With Wickersham.

TAFT IS APPEALED TO.

Hearing on Dissolution of Great Corporation Begins in Circuit Court.

Rumors of a clash between Attorney-General Wickersham and James C. McReynolds, who began the investigation into the Tobacco Trust, engaged more interest today at the hearing on the plan for dissolution of the trust, as submitted to United States Circuit Judge Lacomb, in New York.

Both Attorney General Wickersham and Mr. McReynolds deny the story but as they were seated at the same table in the court room today, the attorney general looked only once at his assistant.

According to the rumor, a missive was despatched to the attorney general at the Hotel Belmont last Saturday in which Mr. McReynolds took exception and asked to be permitted to withdraw from the case immediately instead of leaving it to be inferred that he had he would oppose the plan of dissolution.

Friends of both the Attorney-General and Mr. McReynolds got in touch with President Taft, it is said, and both heard from him yesterday. Efforts to bring about a better understanding between the two were said to be partly successful.

The courtroom was crowded all of today by lawyers and representatives of the corporation. In the proceeding a court is called upon for the first time to tell a trust how it shall dissolve and come within the meaning of the Sherman Anti-Trust law.

TRUST CALLS PLAN AS NEAR PERFECT AS POSSIBLE.

Lawyers for the independents listened to the arguments of the trust's representatives in the hope that something more illuminating than the brief would be spoken. But they were disappointed. Lewis Gass Ledyard, who made the main argument for the Trust, stood on the merits of the brief and prayed that the court accept the plan as about as near perfect as was possible. He went into technical explanations of the proposed dissolution of the Trust into fourteen companies, and in conclusion said: "No plan is absolutely perfect, but this one will restore competition. We mean it in good faith, and I may add that the plan is submitted at a cost of \$2,000,000 to the common stockholders of the American Tobacco Company."

Former Judge Morgan J. O'Brien, representing the 6 per cent. bondholders, approved the plan, and Joseph H. Choate, who said he represented the innocent investors—who might be called the public—appeared, he said, in behalf of the holders of \$2,700,000 worth of 4 per cent. bonds. Approval was also given by James L. Waterhouse for the

preferred stockholders' committee, controlling \$8,000,000 of the stock, and J. C. Krauthoff, who represented many common stockholders.

THE GOVERNMENT WANTS TO WATCH REORGANIZED COS.

Attorney-General Wickersham, in his answer to the plan of reorganization which was filed to-day, says: "Any decree ascertaining and determining upon a plan of disintegration should reserve to the Government the right, at any time within five years from date of entry, to apply to the court for other or further relief upon the showing that, as a matter of fact, such plan has not resulted in creating a new condition which shall be honestly in harmony with and not repugnant to the law."

The Attorney-General asks that whatever plan be adopted it be subject to the following conditions:

The corporations among which the properties and businesses in the combination are to be distributed, for a period of five years shall not have any officers or directors in common. These companies shall not have any stock interest in each other. They shall not employ the same agencies for the purchase of leaf tobacco or other raw material or for the sale of tobacco or other products.

They shall not retain or employ the clerical or other organization or occupy the same office or offices. SAYS NO COMPANY SHALL HOLD STOCK IN ANOTHER. No one of them shall hold capital stock in any other corporation, any

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part of whose stock is also held by any of the other corporations among which the properties of the combination are distributed.

The twenty-nine individual defendants shall be enjoined from acquiring, directly or indirectly, within five years ownership of any amount of stock in any one of the corporations in addition to the amounts they will respectively hold when the plan shall have been carried out.

That the stock of the United Cigar Stores Company be sold and distributed to parties other than the twenty-nine individual defendants. Finally the Attorney General asks for a general injunction prohibiting the re-creation of the combination or of any similar combination.

NEEDS NO NEW POLICEMEN.

Commissioner Waldo Gets Needed Men by Abolishing Soft Snaps.

Police Commissioner Waldo has abolished the large number of extra police details, so he will require no additional men—at least no large number—for the force during 1912. He has so notified the Mayor, who in turn informed the Budget Committee to-day to make no provision

for the 1912 budget for the thousand additional policemen asked for.

President McAnany stated today that the Committee had not passed upon the request for 1,000 extra policemen, but in view of the Mayor's announcement would not consider granting the allowance.
