

FEDERAL APPROVAL GIVEN TO THE PLAN OF TOBACCO TRUST

Wickersham Ignores Pleas of Independents in Giving Sanction to Reorganization.

AGAINST RECEIVERSHIP.

Assistant Attorney-General McReynolds Expected to Leave Case Now.

When Attorney-General Wickersham concluded an hour and a half speech this afternoon in the United States Circuit Court by saying the Government approved the plan of the Tobacco Trust, with some modifications, gloom settled on the faces of the arm of counsel for the Independents.

As a result of Mr. Wickersham's argument, in which he ignored all the pleas of the Independents, it is the belief among those who have been following the case that the Court will approve the plan with some modifications.

BRANDEIS OPEN IN DISAPPOINTMENT OVER PLAN.

Louis D. Brandeis was outspoken in his disappointment. "It means," he said, "that the Independents will be continuing fighting. Instead of having to compete as in the past with one great trust, we will have to fight four big trusts. The trusts are to be left as free as they have been in the past to resort to methods of unfair competition. There is no such thing as fair and honest competition under the plan outlined by the Attorney-General."

"Healing the gravity of the situation which confronted the Government and the Court in this case," the Attorney-General continued, "I have done all in my power to aid in bringing about a new condition without resort to a receivership, and I have conferred frequently with Your Honors and counsel for the defendants to that end."

"I would have been entirely untrue to my trust if I had failed to take that view of this case and extended my powers toward that end."

De Lancy Nicoll, speaking today for the plan, charged that the real object of the Independents was to throw the trust into the hands of a receiver.

"No plan that we suggest will meet with their approval," he declared. "Their real purpose is to bring about a receivership. Our competitors wish to crush us."

"Why should not your competitors wish to crush you?" asked Judge Noyes. "Yes, but they should be fair about their opposition to our plan," continued Mr. Nicoll. "They have submitted a plan so fanciful and impractical that it cannot be considered. All that they want is a chance to grab from the action block some of the good tobaccos and brands of the American Tobacco Company."

Joseph H. Choate, representing the 6 per cent. bondholders, announced this afternoon that if there was incorporated in the reorganization plan the suggestion of Attorney-General Wickersham that the Government be granted the right to appeal to the Court for further relief at any time within five years after the date of the decree, that it would consent to the dissolution plan, and that it surely would fail.

FEUER LOSES DIVORCE SUIT AND MUST PAY WIFE'S COSTS.

Justice Ford Credits Woman's Story of Husband's Connivance in South Africa.

Justice Ford in the Supreme Court today not only refused a decree of divorce to David Feuer, who sued his wife, Fanny, some weeks ago, charging that she had been intimate with an unknown man, but he imposed the penalty of the costs of the trial on the husband, which will amount to some \$25. The trial of the suit took up two weeks. Through her counsel, Maurice Meyer, the wife charged that her husband had been a party to her violations of her marriage vows and that he had even connived at such offenses.

In his opinion today Justice Ford credits the wife's amazing story of a trip to South Africa and her return to New York laden with jewels and gold with her husband. The Court said: "She told a strikingly straight forward story of her life in South Africa, while the plaintiff was proved to be wholly unworthy of belief. I take it to be the law that if a husband induces his wife to commit a statutory offense, he may not afterward obtain a decree of divorce on account of an act subsequently committed."

POLICEMAN'S FIRST AID SAVES MILKMAN'S LIFE.

By making a tourniquet of the cord of his high-top boot and twisting it with his club around the wounded arm of William P. Hallahan, forty-seven, who has a dairy at No. 230 Third avenue, Policeman O'Neil of the East Twenty-second street station probably saved his life early this morning.

M'REE MURDER CASE NEARS JURY; DEFENSE CLOSES

Lawyers for Accused Woman End Testimony by Calling Character Witnesses.

(Special to The Evening World.) OPELOUSAS, La., Oct. 30.—Indications at the opening of court today were that the case of Mrs. Zoe Monroe McRee, who declared she killed Allan Garland, the Tulane student, in defense of her honor, would be in the hands of the jury by to-morrow or Thursday at the latest.

When the accused woman completed her day on the witness stand, recounting details of the tragedy that ended in the killing of young Garland, it was believed that the trial was practically finished, unless the prosecution attempted to spring a surprise in rebuttal.

The defense to-day put on the stand a number of character witnesses. The prosecution objected to introduction of this "character" testimony yesterday, but to-day gave consent.

Ten witnesses which the defense had brought from Louisiana and Mississippi swore that Mrs. McRee's character was considered excellent when she lived in New Orleans and Brandon.

J. E. Allen of Opelousas, who was the first person to enter the house of the McRees after the shooting, said that Mrs. McRee was excited.

"There were tears in her eyes and she seemed to be laboring under intense excitement which she was trying to control," said Allen.

After G. W. Kelly, another character witness, had testified that the reputation of Mrs. McRee was good, the defense announced that its case was closed, subject to rebuttal.

The lawyers for the prosecution secured a recess of the court to determine whether they would call any witnesses in rebuttal.

"We intend to prove that this defendant and Allan Garland were seen alone in the fields," said District Attorney Garland in arguing before the court for rebuttal testimony. We intend to show that they went hunting alone together; that they went riding together; that she was seen with her arm upon his shoulder. We intend to show that her relations with Allan Garland were so intimate that she had no reason to fear violence from him."

This statement, which followed an objection made to the character of the rebuttal evidence being offered by the State, created quite a stir in the court, for it was the first time the State had announced its theory or the motive for the killing.

Mrs. McRee was a trifle pale but showed no other effects of her eight hours' cross-examination of yesterday.

The stock market to-day for the most part pursued an upward course. Overcoming a period of hesitation following the opening, stocks began to move higher. The rising tendency increased as the session progressed. In the final hour prices were moving up with alacrity.

The rise culminated at closing time, when up ranges for the day were established.



ORIGINAL FASHIONS FOR HOME DRESSMAKERS



DESCRIPTION.

A trig street dress of cadet blue broadcloth is made on very simple lines, but trimmed most effectively. The panel front on the waist has small inward turning revers of black velvet and is trimmed with straps of narrow black silk braid, finished with dull gold buttons. A peplum on the skirt which starts at the panel in front cuts away over the hips to a panel in the back, which is continuous in line with that of the waist, and is trimmed with velvet in corresponding effect with the revers in front. The sleeves are in one with the main portion of the waist, finished with a pointed flare cuff of black velvet and trimmed to the elbow with straps of braid and buttons. These also trim the three-piece skirt above a deep band on the bottom, piped at the top with velvet. A distinctive finish to the gown is given by a black velvet belt applied on a white broadcloth foundation and held at the front with a large dull gold buckle.

tion, using purple velvet and braid with gold buttons. Dear Fashion Editor: Kindly let me know how to make over a pretty seven-gored net plaited skirt suitable to wear to social affairs. Am 5 feet 2 inches tall, and unable to wear with silk waistline. The net is black, would appreciate full particulars for making and trimming if such is necessary.

From the full skirt you will have enough for a dress which could be trimmed with black silk fringe over the shoulders attached to straps of black velvet 1 1/2 inches wide. Make the skirt five-gored, trimming with black velvet ribbon, which starts from left side of the belt where the shoulder strap ends, and slants diagonally down to encircle the lower part of the skirt, and slanting up again to the front ends under the ribbon, not continuing all the way to the belt. Edge wear the black velvet with silk fringe, which will give a tulle effect. Edge the sleeves with fringe and finish the belt with a crush of satin.

Dear Fashion Editor: Please suggest a way to make a waist of inclosed sample to be worn with a brown velveteen coat suit. Am past forty, 40 bust, 31 waist, medium height. Desire to keep the first one color; also sleeves long and high neck. Is ribbon velvet for trimming out of date? MRS. E. L.

Your net, being embroidered, does not need much trimming. Make it plain, with the long sleeves set in with a brown silk cording, trimmed with satin buttons up the back, and finished with a fall of brown plaited net at the wrist. Pipe the round yoke with lavender or some other becoming color, and have the yoke of brown net, with a touch of narrow gold trimming at the top of the collar. 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You could make the blue with a medium low round neck, finished with narrow crystal trimming, and a yoke of either dash color or fine silver, set with high collar finished with the same trimming. Over the shoulders have a collar of blue chiffon cloth weighted with narrow crystal fringe, which also finishes the short sleeves of satin with folds of chiffon cloth. The skirt is draped up in the front just below the knees held with a crystal cabochon, showing the satin in the point. The diagonal material would look well made like the illustration.

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GIRL TOO WEAK TO HAVE KILLED MONIACO UNAIDED

Coroner's Physician O'Hanlon Finds 25 Stab Wounds in Body.

FOUR MEN'S HATS SEEN.

Theory Advanced That Friends of Rival Whom Moniaco Shot Were Seeking Revenge.

Could slender little Nicolette Lenaire, the twenty-year-old girl held in the Tombs as the self-confessed slayer of Frank Moniaco, have inflicted the twenty-five stab wounds that Coroner's Physician Philip P. O'Hanlon found in the man's body in yesterday's autopsy? Dr. Hanlon is convinced that the girl, who weighs only about 100 pounds and is only five feet tall, could not have found the strength, even under excitement, to carry such a furious attack through to the last mortal stroke. He has reported his belief to the police, who are also inclined to doubt the girl's story.

The girl is known to have been Moniaco's sweetheart for some time but to have been on bad terms with him for several weeks before his death. She is also known to have been friendly with Michael Barberi, for shooting whom Moniaco was under \$5,000 bail at the time of his death in the girl's home at No. 229 East One Hundred and Ninth street.

SUSPECT BARBERI'S FRIENDS HAD HAND IN THE MURDER. The police are now working on the theory that the girl aided some of Barberi's friends to secure revenge by luring Moniaco to her room. He had been trying to get her to take him back but had been repulsed and would easily have fallen into a trap laid by the girl. This theory is strengthened by the story of a woman living in the house, who says she passed the Lenaire door just before the murder and saw four men's hats on a table and that after the murder had been reported she looked again and the hats were gone.

According to the girl, Moniaco came to her apartment while she was alone, and after trying to force her to receive his attentions attempted to rob the large carving knife and in her rage struck and struck again until Moniaco lay senseless at her feet.

Dr. O'Hanlon, when seen by an Evening World reporter to-day, said: "I found nine wounds in the man's head, seven in his back and nine more scattered over all parts of his body. The wounds in the head were superficial cuts and gashes that looked as

though they were made in a terrific struggle. The cuts all over his body were of this character also. For instance, one thumb was slit completely open, as though he had grasped the knife by the blade and tried to tear it from his assailant's grip. "In the back there were four wounds, any one of which would have been mortal, as each penetrated the lung. The other three gashed in the back were from one to two inches long and made with more than ordinary strength."

DOCTOR SURE THE GIRL HADN'T THE STRENGTH TO DO IT. "I cannot see how it was possible for this girl to find the strength to make the prolonged fight evidenced by the man's condition. She might have struck a fatal blow or two in the strength of her fury, but in my opinion, no woman of her slight strength could carry through such a ferocious attack."

The room in which the body was found was in a wild state of disorder, and so furious had been the struggle that the 200-pound safe had been tipped over. One of Moniaco's legs was caught under the safe. Madeline Lenaire refused to make any comment on the physician's report, which is to start from Nov. 17, 1911. The Tombs officials said she had refused to speak with any one but her attorney.

SOCIETY ACTRESS SUES. Mrs. Kathryn M. Cass, who, as Kathryn Van Wormer, was a prominent society girl of St. Louis, and later became a star in one of the "Paid in Full" companies, as Katherine Dixon, to-day began suit for an absolute divorce from her husband, Ira F. Cass, general manager of the theatrical woman. Mrs. Cass names the theatrical woman, whose identity is not disclosed by Mrs. Van Wormer's counsel, Joseph T. Cashman.

Before her marriage to Cass in November, 1902, Miss Van Wormer had been conspicuous in St. Louis society theatricals. Her romance with Cass then in charge of one of the many Shubert enterprises, followed the young woman's application for a place on the stage.

After reading Mrs. Cass's complaint, Justice Bischoff awarded her alimony at the rate of \$25 a week pending the trial of the issues of her suit. Mr. Cass did not oppose the amount of alimony, which is to start from Nov. 17, 1911.
