BUILDING CODE TO AID TILE TRUST STRIKES A SNAG

Tammany Aldermen Have Disregarded Important Rule in Preparing Ordinance.

In their haste in trying to tam through a building code favoring the hollow tile trust the Tammany Aldermen may have overreached themselves.

All ordinances introduced shall be in writing. Ordinances which are amendatory of or repeal any existing law, code or ordinance, or any part of either thereof, shall contain in parentheses the part amended or repealed and shall have the new part which is to be inserted marked by underscoring.

Mayor Gaynor expressed surprise today when he returned from St. James and learned that the outgoing Board of Aldermen was prepared to rush through a building code. In any event, he added, nothing would be decided by him until he had given a public hearing or a series of public hearings, when all objections would be heard fully.

The Mayor said that in its original form and before he made several suggestions the code granted a virtual monopoly to the hollow tile trust.

COURT CONFIRMS SALE OF THIRD AVENUE RAILROAD

Conveyance to the Railway Company Will Take Effect on New Year's.

Judge Lacombe of the United States Circuit Court today approved as to form the confirmation deed made by the Third Avenue Railroad Company to the Third Avenue Railway Company, which has its principal office at No. 236 Third Avenue.

The deed, after telling of the purchase of the Third Avenue property by James N. Wallace, Adrian Iselin and Harry Bronner on March 1, 1910, for \$25,000,000, by depositing first consolidated mortgage bonds of the aggregate face value of \$25,000,000 with unpaid coupons attached, tells of the confirmation of the sale on April 13, 1910.

Receiver Fredrick W. Whitridge was also directed to join in the decree of confirmation. He was further directed to turn over to the purchasers all the property of the Third Avenue Company, including the cars and equipment acquired by him with the proceeds of receiver's certificates.

COURT SETS FREE TWO CROOKS WHO LURKED IN BANK

Holds There Was Not Proof That Darrington and Parker Intended to Commit Crime.

Joseph Darrington and Harry Parker, old-time crooks, who were arrested while lurking around the National Park Bank, No. 214 Broadway, on the morning of Dec. 20, were arraigned today in Special Sessions on the charge of unlawful entry.

Justice McInerney, Mayo and Salmon decided, after George F. Lawler, the on-armed guard of the bank, had told him he had watched both men enter and leave the bank, that the prosecution had failed to prove that Darrington and Parker had committed a crime.

HELD WITHOUT BAIL

Andrew McConnell, author of "Universal Life," and inventor of an electrical device for obtaining perpetual life, who shot his wife at Ocean Grove, N. J., last Saturday, was rearrested today in the West Side Court and held without bail to await extradition.

WHITMAN HINTS AT INDICTMENTS IN THE HYDE CASE

"Infers" That Grand Jury May Take Up Tilden's Affidavit Relating to Prejudice.

District-Attorney Whitman was asked today whether he has seen the statements of the men supposed to have been interviewed by Israel Tilden Jr., a law student, who denied having expressed themselves as to the guilt or innocence of former City Chamberlain Charles H. Hyde, under indictment in connection with the Carnegie Trust failure.

Mr. Whitman said he inferred that the matter would be brought to the attention of the Grand Jury. Tilden, in an affidavit attached to the application of Charles H. Hyde for a change of venue, told of interviewing more than 100 persons, all of whom he said, had denounced Hyde.
