

FUNERAL OF ACTOR BLOCKS STREET AS CROWD HONORS HIM

Thousands Seek to Enter
Thalia Theatre for Last Rites
of Henry J. Ginsberg.

Henry J. Ginsberg, who at the age of twenty-two came to this country from Kiev, Russia, a poor, friendless workman, was mourned by thousands on the east side to-day, and more than a thousand persons attended his funeral in the Thalia Theatre, while Police Inspector John Lally and Capt. Thomas Tierney had to form lines of 200 patrolmen to prevent the crowds, unable to gain admission, from blocking traffic in the Bowery.

Ginsberg was one of the leading Hebrew actors and had developed from obscurity to popularity because of his ability as a character impersonator and

singer. He died suddenly in the German Hospital after an operation. His body was removed from his home, at No. 313 East Eighteenth street, to the rooms of the Hebrew Actors' Club, No. 165 Second avenue, whence, after brief services, three hundred actors and many more of his friends marched as escort to the theatre.

In addition to the escort, 150 carriages followed the procession to Washington Cemetery in Brooklyn. The honorary pallbearers were Jacob P. Adler, Ivin Abrahamson, David Kessler, Boris Tomaszewsky, Joseph Adleston and Max Villner.

At the theatre the casket was placed on the stage, while Jacob P. Adler, his manager, in whose company Ginsberg was leading man, spoke a brief eulogy. He announced a benefit would be played for the widow and son of the dead actor. Joseph Baroness and others spoke and Rabbi Schromok read from the Psalms. A chorus of twenty-five from various theatrical companies, under the leadership of Louis Wohl, sang the "Kaddish" or "Death prayer," as the body was borne from the theatre.

PRISON ON COIN'S TOSS.

John De Cicco, the youth who was convicted of robbery in the first degree by a jury before Judge Rosalaky in the Court of General Sessions yesterday, after another jury had set free his pal, Samuel Jacoby, on the same testimony, was to-day sentenced to Sing Sing for ten years.

After his conviction De Cicco told

Judge Rosalaky that Jacoby and he planned and executed a robbery. "Some guys are born lucky," he told his counsel, Charles P. Howe. "It was a loose-up between Jacoby and myself who should be tried first. Jacoby called 'heads' and won. If I had been tried first I would have been acquitted."

ORDER OF GOLDEN SEAL ASKS FOR RECEIVERSHIP.

Misappropriation by Heads of Beneficial Society Is Alleged by Petitioning Members.

Petition for a receivership for the Order of the Golden Seal, a beneficiary society of Roxbury, N. Y., which recently had a membership of 30,000, has been presented to the State Insurance Department at Albany. The petitioners allege that the heads of the order have misappropriated \$27,417 and applied this money "illegally to the exploitation of different companies for their own gain."

CARDINAL FARLEY SAILS.

NAPLES, Jan. 5.—Cardinal Farley and his suite, who left here to-day on board the Berlin for New York, were the centre of attraction of a large crowd on their way from the hotel to the quay. Notwithstanding that the day was cloudy a considerable number of prominent people gathered to bid farewell to the Cardinal.

As the liner Berlin left with Cardinal Farley and his suite on board this afternoon, hundreds of friends and admirers waved their hats and handkerchiefs in farewell.

SUES MARY MANNERING.

Shubert's Ask \$60,000 for Breach of Contract.

The Shuberts filed a suit in the Supreme Court this afternoon against Mary Manning for \$60,000 for breach of contract. They alleged that in October, 1908, they entered into a contract with the noted actress for a three years' engagement, and that in September, 1911, Miss Manning "wrongfully, whimsically and capriciously" refused to carry out her part of the contract. Miss Manning, whose domicile is in Michigan, has asked that the case be transferred from the Supreme Court to the Federal Court for trial.
