
Brown Wins Over Attell in Poor Battle Because He Does the Rushing While Attell Works on Defense.

Develop the Athletic Girl That She May Grow Into Strong Womanhood—Her Influence on the Race Is Important, Says Dr. Sargent, Harvard's Physical Instructor.

Talks With Prof. Sargent—No. 6. THE most important factor in preventing the physical decline of the Anglo-Saxon race," says Prof. Sargent, "is what is known as the 'athletic girl'."
