LACONIA TRIED OUT IN EVERY VARIETY OF OCEAN WEATHER

Baptized on Maiden Voyage in Rain, Hail, Sleet, Snow, Thunder and Lightning.

The new Cunard liner Laconia, an 18,000 ton steamship built for the Boston-Liverpool service, arrived here today on her maiden voyage and, according to her passengers and officers, was baptized with almost every known variety of ocean weather on her first trip across.

Setting out with fair and almost balmy winds, the Laconia ran into storm after storm, blow after blow. The gales swung around the compass, bringing rain, hail, sleet and snow and winding up last night with a thunder-and-lightning blitzard.

The snow was so thick that the fog horn was tooting incessantly, when suddenly there came a blinding flash of lightning, followed by a crashing roar. It seemed as if the smoke room had been struck and it was emptied in a mad scramble. Investigation proved that the bolt had not struck the ship. There were a dozen more flashes of lightning and the rolling of thunder lasted more than an hour.

Among the passengers on the new Cunard were Francis, Count Lutetow, Chamberlain to the Emperor of Austria, and a famous Bohemian scholar and author, and his wife, Anna, Baroness Bonemann. Count Lutetow has the degree of Litt. D. from Oxford, Ph. D. from the University of Prague, A. M. and A. B. in Paris, is a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society of London, a Fellow of the Royal Literary Society of London and a member of almost every important scientific and literary body in Europe.

He has come to this country at the behest of the Bohemian American Press Association and will deliver a series of lectures at Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Cornell and many other colleges on the real Bohemia, its aims and progress. In order to demonstrate that the Bohemia of the medieval poet has no connection with the Bohemia of the Austrian Empire.

The Baroness Bonemann is also a prominent figure in Bohemia. She does not sympathize with the suffragette movement.

Other passengers on the Laconia were C. M. Turner, inventor of the diving watch, and Thomas Gray, for many years a purser in the employ of the Cunard Line, who is convalescing from a long illness and will remain on the new vessel until it enters the Boston-Liverpool service in the spring.

Leaving New York, the Laconia will make a long trip to Egypt and back and then go to Boston.

GOV. TENER DENIES HE'S FOR ROOSEVELT.

Taft Now and Always, and Story of Cheering Colonel's Picture is "Absurd."

HARRISBURG, Jan. 29.—Gov. John K. Tener today emphatically denied that he favored Roosevelt as a Presidential candidate and reiterated his sentiment favoring Taft.

Gov. Tener was shown a photograph sent him from New York yesterday to the effect that he had stopped off on his way to Adirondacks; that he dined in a roadway restaurant, and when a picture of Roosevelt was thrown upon a tree, he loudly cheered and declared Roosevelt was the "man Pennsylvania suits."

"The story is absurd," he said. "I've always been and am today an ardent admirer and supporter of President Taft."

Today's stock market during the morning period was still under the influence of the St. Paul statement, which broke prices from 2 to 3 points Saturday. The opening was met by further liquidation that quickly lowered Union Pacific, Steel, Reading and the Coppers over 1 point. Liquidation in the copper group was especially heavy, due to an additional cut in the price of the metal in London. The list pursued its downward trend until well into the afternoon, when a substantial rebound developed.

As was the case last week, the late afternoon was headed by New York Central and Reading. These issues exhibited pronounced rising power. The local traction and a few specialties were also prominent.

A striking movement in the last few minutes reduced the list from the highest at closing time, with the result that the majority of net changes were fractional losses.

RICH MAN SLAIN IN PISTOL DUEL WITH CHAUFFEUR

Moore Was Spying on Wife Who Had Sued Him for a Divorce in Frisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—John J. Moore, wealthy clubman and coal dealer, shot in a revolver duel with Samuel L. Timothy, a chauffeur, near the residence of Mrs. Moore in Hillsboro, a suburb, died last night.

Mrs. Moore is immured in her home, where she has lived alone since she brought a sensational but unsuccessful divorce suit two months ago. She has refused to see any one but District Attorney Franklin Swartz of San Mateo County.

Moore's statement of the shooting was given out by City Attorney Kirkbride today. It follows: "I have been living at the Pacific Union Club in San Francisco, since my separation from my wife, but have made several trips to Hillsboro to watch her. Lying in wait near the house, I saw her in the machine with this chauffeur. I stopped the car and ordered her to get out. She refused, and I opened fire. Then I was shot."

Timothy, in jail at Redwood City, sticks to his statement that his motor failed as he was driving past the Moore house on the country road, and that a man whom he believed to be a highwayman opened fire on him. "I did not want to kill. I only shot in self-defense as the man advanced and continued to fire at me," he says.

MRS. MOORE DENIES SHE WAS OUT IN CAR. Mrs. Moore denies that she had been out riding with Timothy Saturday night or any other night, she said. "I was in my house all evening. My husband was insanely jealous and this is only one of a series of violent acts on his part. After our divorce was denied in Redwood City he threatened to kill all my witnesses at the trial. Timothy was one of those witnesses."

"I know little of the man. He worked for us a year or so ago, but I had no idea he had any affection for me. That I would go out with him when I knew my husband had spied on my trail all the time is absurd."

"I have been dogged for a year and a half. In all that time my husband could not get any witness against me to aid his case in court."

The divorce suit in which Mrs. Moore sought freedom attracted unusual attention because the name of Rear Admiral Thomas E. Phelps, retired, was brought into the case in Moore's cross complaint. SLAYER HAS WIFE AND CHILD IN CHICAGO. Timothy is the son of a wealthy horse dealer in Chicago and has a wife and child living in that city, according to Claude Lillian Cooper-Gray, a music hall singer appearing here. Moore died in a San Mateo hospital last night.

"I met Timothy two years ago," the singer said. "We grew fond of each other and he asked me to marry him, later confessing that he had left a wife and child in Chicago nine years ago. "About nine months ago," she said, "he told me he was shadowing a rich man here and expected to make a lot of money. Then, he said, he would marry me."

District Attorney Franklin Swartz of San Mateo County said today that, since Moore's statement made it clear that Moore had fired first, Timothy probably never would be convicted of murder, although such a charge would be brought against him.

HILL MINE GROUP DENIES AIDING TRUST. West Messabe Land Company Files Answer as Defendants in Steel Suit.

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 29.—Walter J. Hill, Louis W. Hill, James N. Hill and Edward T. Nicholas, who, as trustees of mining interests, were named with other defendants in the anti-trust action of the Government against the United States Steel Corporation and subsidiary concerns, filed their answer in the United States District Court here today. They deny that they have engaged in any confederacy in restraint of trade contrary to law. They admit that the lease of the Great Western Mining Company, otherwise the West Messabe Land Company, agreed to ship ore over the Great Northern Railway, paying a royalty. They deny that the royalty agreed upon was unreasonably large or in excess of the value of the consideration.
