ROOSEVELT IN PLEA FOR LABOR INQUIRY

Commissioner Should Be Appointed to Investigate Industrial Conditions, He Says.

A plea for living wages and closer co-operation between capital and labor is made by Col. Theodore Roosevelt, in the current number of the Outlook, in which he relates his experiences in investigating a Brooklyn factory, which, he says, is ideally conducted.

"There must be full recognition," says Col. Roosevelt, "by the public of the fact that no business can be permanently good for this country unless the wage worker is paid a high wage and works under conditions favorable to his health and safety. On his part, the wage worker must, as a matter of justice and personal pride, do first class work for that wage and in his private character must be a good citizen—and so must his employer."

"We hear much of the conflict between capital and labor, and often it seems to be assumed that this conflict is inevitable, and that capitalists and wage-workers must be considered primarily as belonging to different classes, each individual being judged only by the standard of his own class. This is a thoroughly false and unhealthy view, from the standpoint of the country, from the standpoint of good citizenship,

the differences between employer and employed are of mighty small consequence compared with the need that each side show that he possesses the great fundamental virtues. All should be in the one class whose existence is vital to the republic, the class that contains, whether on the farm or in the workshop or in the counting room, the decent, hard-working, self-respecting citizens."

Roosevelt then urges all Congress members to support President Taft's demand for the creation of a commission to investigate industrial conditions in this country. Its work would absolutely settle, he says, many problems between capital and labor that are now in dispute.

In conclusion Roosevelt says: "But only an inquiry by the Federal Government can be authoritative and satisfactory, and can really cover all of the different sides of the matter and throw full light upon all the puzzling, baffling, complicated and vitally important questions involved."

JERSEY CITY DELUGED.

Water Main Bursts and Floods Cellars of Nearby Houses.

The watermain in front of No. 92 Bright street, Jersey City, burst early today. When the seeping water had softened the earth above it there was a roar and a rush which made a fountain three inches in diameter and twenty feet high play in the middle of the street. The sewer openings were clogged with ice and the street was flooded in a very few minutes.

The cellar of the saloon of Herman Kamens, opposite the break, filled first and then the cellars of the houses on both sides of the street. Men from the water department tried to shut off the main but found the valves frozen fast. The flooding continued for more than two hours before the cut-off could be thawed out. Meanwhile fire engines were called to pump out the cellars. The burst caused a damage of about \$10,000.

CONFESSES PLOT IN MARRIAGE TO RICH AMERICAN

English Woman Says Husband Forced Her to Commit Bigamy to Get Money.

LONDON, Feb. 16.—A remarkable sequel has developed to the marriage between Horace Field Parrish of Millford, N. Y., the American capitalist-engineer, who is chairman of the Central London Tube Railway, and Mrs. Deborah Jeffreys, which took place at Eltham Registry Office on May 8 of last year.

The woman was arraigned yesterday at the Bow Street Police Court on a charge of bigamy. She is a very attractive woman and appeared before the Magistrate in a handsome costume. In answer to the charge she said: "I am deeply sorry for what I have done. I wouldn't have done it if my husband hadn't made me."

In a formal statement made to the court, she declared that she first met Mr. Parrish in January, 1911, when she was presented as a widow. He afterward proposed marriage to her. Her husband, Herbert H. Jeffreys, from whom she was separated, urged her to




