

**TITLED GUEST
AT PARK AVENUE
DISROBED IN HALL**

Count Yvon De La Motte,
Who Has Queer Notions,
Taken to Bellevue.

Count Yvon de la Motte of Paris, but more recently of the psychopathic ward of Bellevue Hospital, was in a morose mood to-day, because Dr. Gregory has him under observation as to his sanity. The Count, who has singular ideas about himself, was taken to the hospital from the Park Avenue Hotel, after he had made a disturbance yesterday and attempted to disrobe himself in the corridor of the second floor.

He had been at the hotel since October 12. On Friday last the hotel management noticed that he was behaving queerly. Yesterday's disrobing act was the finishing touch. On Saturday he had gone to Police Headquarters and asked Lieutenant Manning for police protection and an immediate interview with the French Consul General. The police were too busy to pay much attention to him.

"He is quite quiet now," said Dr. Gregory, "and if he progresses in this way he will probably be released in four or five days."

One of the Count's ideas was that he was connected with the George Washington Coffee Company of No. 79 Wall street. W. J. Arkell, secretary of the company, said to-day:

"The Count de la Motte came to see me about two months ago. He wanted an exclusive option to sell our coffee in France and showed me letters from W. B. Corey, he having returned from Europe last fall on the same steamer on which Mr. Corey sailed. He seemed queer to me the last time he called and to get rid of him I told him the price of the option would be \$2,000,000. That didn't seem to bother him in the least, and he replied that Mr. Corey would furnish the money without delay. Since then I have not seen him. He is not connected with this company in any way."

"He told me one day that his father was one of the most distinguished engineers in the world, and that the English Government owed him \$1,000,000 for engineering work."

At Bellevue the Count told them that he was the head of a great religious movement, the Legion of the Holy Grail, which would ally France, Great Britain and this country, under the whole world and revolutionary religion.

The only person who has been at all interested in the Count since his arrival at Bellevue is Dr. H. Holbrook Curtis of No. 113 Madison avenue. He called the hospital by telephone to inquire as to the Count's condition.

ISN'T SOON CURRIED**

In Fact Jumbo's Toilet Re-
quires an Hour, for He's
20½ Hands Tall.

Right this way, ladies and gentlemen, for the big free show on the inside! Galber close and see the largest horse in the world! See Jumbo, the colossal equine wonder! He's the size of an elephant, has the strength of a switching engine and eats a bushel of oats every twenty-four hours.

Jumbo was born and raised in the Western country, where they grow things big. He was secured at an enormous expenditure by Mack Brothers, truckmen, of No. 512 West Forty-ninth street. He will daily be seen pulling a double truck through the streets of our fair city, dragging tons and tons of freight with the utmost ease.

This noble monster is five years old, weighs 2,400 pounds and stands twenty and one-half hands high, which, translated into the vernacular, means six feet ten inches from his shoulder to the pavement. A tall man would need a stepladder to see over his back, and it takes an hour to go over him with an extra size currycomb.

For all his size he is kind and gentle, which you can readily see from the way he treats his stallmate, guide, philosopher and friend, little Peewee, a shaggy Shetland pony, seventeen inches high, who walks all over Jumbo, taking liberties which would make the hardest sunder to behold. Jumbo's head weighs more than the pony's whole body, yet the little animal is as safe with him as a child in its mother's arms.

No harness in all the equipment of Jumbo's owner was found big enough to encircle his huge sides, so they had a special double size collar and breeching made for him. One good bushel of oats and part of a bale of hay disappear into his cavernous interior in the course of a day.

Speaking scientifically, the elephantine equine is of the Clydesdale breed, the biggest of his race. No other horse will work with him. He was hitched the other day with another monster standing 17½ hands, but the smaller horse shied away and refused to work. So Jumbo will have to do the work of two horses.
