HOW HOUSEHOLD EFFICIENCY CAN BE EASILY ACQUIRED

Mrs. Clyde Furst, Expert, Advises Women to Use Their Brain More.

DO LESS HAND WORK. Suggestions As to Labor-Saving Devices in the Kitchen and Home.

Marguerite Mooers Marshall. "How to Be Happy Though a Housekeeper," was the real title of the talk Mrs. Clyde Furst of Teachers' College gave the Ethical Culture Society yesterday afternoon...

"Housekeeping need not be drudgery, nor yet boredom," she declared. "Everything depends on the way it is done..."

"Of course, all sensible women are agreed that the old cumbersome habit of doing everything by hand should be given up..."

HOUSEWIVES WHO USE THEIR INTELLIGENCE. "The wise housewife follows none of these courses. She invests in various domestic improvements..."

"But are not all the new kitchen devices expensive?" I asked. "For instance, the so-called electric apparatus for cooking..."

"The most practical contrivances for lessening the labor of the average housewife are quite within reach of the average husband's purse..."

"Take the alcohol stove, used in combination with the fireless cooker. This is not only an agreeable but a most inexpensive way of getting rid of the hot, dirty coal range..."

"Another most practical device for any housewife is a new kind of double boiler, which is really a steam cooker. The loss of food value in boiling is much greater than is commonly supposed. Also, in the ordinary double boiler, the steam entering at the bottom escapes at the top of the utensil, and with it much of the natural flavor of the article which is being cooked..."

"The average housekeeper makes a great many unnecessary movements. A wheel tray to go from the kitchen to the dining room is one way of saving steps. All the necessities for the meal can be taken in at one trip and everything can be removed at once..."

BROOKLYN Y. C. OLD HOME BURNS

Fire Demolishes Building at Bensonhurst in Less Than Half Hour.

The old home of the Brooklyn Yacht Club, a two-story frame building on Gravesend Bay, between Bay Thirty-fourth and Bay Thirty-fifth street, Bensonhurst, was completely destroyed by fire to-day. The high gale scattered sparks from the burning structure over several blocks. One house on Bay Thirty-fourth street, near Cropsy avenue, caught fire in this way, but the flames were extinguished without much damage...

Two ailments were sent in, bringing engines from Bath Beach and Coney Island, the latter having much difficulty in getting to the scene on account of deep mud in the roads. Though it was impossible to save the building, the firemen had their hands full in protecting the neighborhood from the flying sparks...

GETS BODY OF A WOMAN BY ORDER OF THE COURT. Contest of Undertakers Over Preparing It for Burial Settled by Magistrate.

A contest between undertakers for the possession of a corpse was taken before Magistrate Appleton in Yorkville Police Court to-day. After hearing the evidence the Magistrate directed Nicholas T. Brown, an undertaker at No. 123 First avenue, to turn over to Charles O'Brien, an undertaker at Fifty-seventh street and Second avenue, the body of Dominica Kappa, who died last night in Flower Hospital...

Dominica Kappa was struck by an automobile at Seventy-fourth street and Madison avenue Tuesday night. When her brother Francesco of No. 235 East Forty-sixth street was notified of her death he went to the hospital to claim the body. He does not speak English and readily signed a paper handed to him by a man he met at the hospital. Then he went to Undertaker O'Brien and authorized him to prepare the body for burial. O'Brien found that the corpse of Dominica had been turned over to Brown, and Brown refused to give it up unless he be reimbursed for certain expenses. Brown produced the paper Kappa had signed at the hospital, which proved to be his authorization to handle the funeral. Kappa and his lawyer, James F. Carroll, got a summons for Brown from Magistrate Appleton. The Magistrate held that the paper signed by Kappa was of no value. Brown, after hearing the decision of the Magistrate, hastened to transfer Dominica Kappa's remains to O'Brien.
