

HOLD-UP ARTIST FELLS HIS VICTIM WITH SUGAR BOWL

Luncheon Cook Baffles Six
Thieves by Taking Cash
From Till.

Though there were revolvers, a carving knife and other weapons handy, it was a sugar bowl that did the damage early today during an attempted hold-up in Harry Horowitz's all-night lunch room at No. 136 Amsterdam avenue.

Ernest Wilson is the cook and man in charge at night. He always takes the money out of the cash register about midnight and stows it away in his jeans. He had this morning a roll of about \$200 when six men burst in and got something to eat. Three others were sitting at tables at the time.

The six late arrivals walked up to the counter as if to get something else, when one shoved a revolver into Wilson's face and ordered him to put up his hands. At the same instant two of the men rushed to the door and attempted to force the empty cash register.

Wilson ducked and ran to the rear to get something to help him save his \$200. The three customers tried to get out, but were held by the wall and forced to put up their hands. But one suddenly recovered his courage and began throwing plates at the bandits. The place was in full view of the street and the crashing crockery caused considerable commotion.

The robber who had followed Wilson to the rear of the place found him with a long carving knife, and Wilson made a dive for him with it. This robber apparently had no revolver, as he picked up a heavy sugar bowl and threw it with such good aim it caught the cook on the head and knocked him down. Wilson thereupon "squawked" so loudly that the three victims on the other side of the partition including the one practicing with all the lates in sight, joined the chorus and the thugs became alarmed.

"We'd better beat it or we'll get pinched," said one of them. They had not succeeded in getting a cent out of the crowd and left hurriedly.

BLOWN FROM A TRAIN. DIES OF HIS INJURIES.

Strange Accident to Sergt. O'Keefe
of Coast Artillery at Sandy Hook.

As if he had been a bit of paper instead of a sturdy, heavy man, Sergt. Bernard O'Keefe of the Coast Artillery was blown yesterday from a Government train at Sandy Hook. He died today in the post hospital of his injuries.

The storm which swirled about this region yesterday was particularly severe at Sandy Hook. The wind roared about the long, low spit of sand in such a way that it was impossible for anyone to walk against it at times.

O'Keefe was detailed to superintend the transport of supplies for the post from the High Island and the Government railway train conveying them was on its way to the post when the sergeant attempted to pass from one car to another. Then the screaming wind caught him and he was blown off a platform, falling to the ground and being struck by the train.

He struck beside the track and when he was picked up it was seen he was mortally injured. The train hurried him to the hospital, but the post surgeons could not save his life. His body will be sent to his relatives in Baltimore.

Gives \$150,000 to U. of P.

"NO CHANCE FOR YOU," HE READS; ENDS HIS LIFE.

Fatal Message in Newspaper, Blasting His Hopes of a Position, Drives Father of Seven to Suicide.

After reading an answer to a query which he had sent to a newspaper which conducts a civil service column, Robert Hill, forty-two years old, of No. 1740 Pacific street, Brooklyn, committed suicide by shooting himself in the right temple at his home early today.

Since last September Hill had been out of work, struggling at odd jobs to support his wife, Anna, and their seven children, the oldest of whom is fourteen and the youngest one year. Late in the Department of Bridges and seemingly passed. His appointment did not come, however, and he wrote to the civil service column, signing himself R. H., and asking what chance he had of getting the place. To-day he read the reply: "R. H. No chance at all."

In a few minutes he went to his bedroom and, wearing himself on the bed, fired a revolver bullet through his brain. His son, Robert Jr., nine years old, heard the shot and discovered his father. Another son, Walter, seven ran to the police station for aid. Dr. Robert of St. John's Hospital, who was summoned, declared the shot had brought instant death. The widow and the seven children are left destitute.
