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THREE KNEW PERIL OF TRAINS; AWAITED CERTAIN COLLISION

'Phoned Danger on Georgia Central and Relief Special Started Before Crash Came.

AUGUSTA, Ga., March 8.—Before two trains on the Central of Georgia that were speeding head-on toward each other had actually crashed early today, a wrecking train was hurrying on its way to the point where the passenger and heavy freight were expected to collide.

A freight conductor who discovered the error that he knew would cause a wreck gave the alarm and before the doomed trains crashed, help was speeding toward them.

Three men knew a passenger train and a freight were going to crash, but they were powerless to prevent the collision. A freight train, running in two sections, was ordered to take the siding at Tuttleidge for the passenger train.

The orders were forgotten. The first section of the freight failed to stop. As the second section, immediately behind, reached Tuttleidge, Conductor Allen saw the tall lights of the first train disappearing behind a bend in the track.

He rushed to a telephone, called up the operator at Social Circle and asked if the passenger train had left there. The operator's reply of "yes" was drowned in Allen's exclamation of fear.

Hurriedly he told the operator that the first section of the freight had left Tuttleidge and was running at top speed toward the onrushing passenger train. There was no hope of averting a collision.
