DELEGATE HINTS 500,000 MINERS HERE WILL STRIKE

Representatives of Men Arrive to Meet the Operators in Conference.

OWNERS REMAIN FIRM.

No Concession or Compromise Seems Possible Now From Either Side.

The anthracite coal operators and the representatives of the miners were drawing their lines in this city today...

John P. White, President of the United Mine Workers of America, arrived this morning from his home at Catawba, Pa.

"We may receive the reply of the operators today," said Mr. White, "but until we do receive it we cannot say what will be our next step in the situation."

"I can't see any way out of it," was the statement made today by one of the coal miners who arrived from Philadelphia to participate in the conference here between the miners and the operators...

In the party arriving here were Samuel J. Richards, secretary, and John Fahy, president of District No. 8, from Shamokin; John P. Dempsey of Scranton, president of District No. 1; John M. Mack, secretary of District No. 10, from Kingston; John Fallon of Wilkes-Barre, secretary of District No. 11; and Thomas H. Hagan of Morristown, an international board member.

When they were asked what they expected the result of their negotiations to be, the operators would be all refused to say, with the exception of the man who said that he could see no way out of it.

There appears to be every likelihood that when the representatives of the United Mine Workers of America meet the representatives of the coal operators the miners will be told that they may either strike on April 1, as they threaten, or submit a less drastic set of demands.

The Committee of Ten appointed last week by the anthracite coal operators met yesterday afternoon in the office of the Central Railroad of New Jersey at No. 14 Liberty street and decided to stand pat on their demand for a grant of a single one of the nine demands recently presented by John P. White, the miners' president.


This attitude of the miners' officers as to their present position will be nothing less for them to do but call out the anthracite workers and possibly the bituminous miners. Such a move would affect about 500,000 miners, of which 100,000 are in the anthracite fields.

Local lighterage charges have gone up about 10 cents a ton within two days and the boat rates to Fall River have increased. Coal, however, is coming in freely, and there will not be an actual pinch for at least three weeks.

The Consolidated Gas Company has executed a contract for coal for one year instead of for six months, as is usual, and the New York Edison Company has taken similar action.

SIX MILLIONAIRE TRUST OFFICIALS ASSAILED BY WISE

United States District-Attorney Opens His Case at Sugar Combine Trial.

The unprecedented spectacle of six millionaires facing a criminal prosecution that may result in their being sent to prison began in earnest today when United States District-Attorney Wise opened the Government's case against the Sugar Trust officials before Judge Hand in the Criminal Branch of the United States District Court.

It was an older law than the Sherman law that the District-Attorney invoked at the opening of his address. He attacked the list of defendants and declared at the outset that the men on trial were guilty of violating a law handed down by the Almighty to Moses.

OUTLINES THE PLAN FOR GOBLING A RIVAL. The District-Attorney gave a detailed account of the methods employed by the Sugar Trust in getting information about the Pennsylvania company and worming their way into control.

Mr. Wise continued to show how Senator Fell for the scheme and how the Sugar Trust came into control of the rival concern, according to Mr. Wise the Trust took immediate steps toward the utter ruin and dissolution of the captured company.

SUGAR TRUST RECORDS BROUGHT INTO COURT.

The first witness called by the Government was Joseph P. Freeman, Secretary of the Sugar Trust. He was sworn merely to produce the minute books of the stockholders' annual meetings from 1904 to 1911.

HIGHEST COURT MAY AGAIN HEAR CASE ON PATENTS

Wickersham Favors Plan to Have Decision Upholding Monopoly Set Aside.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Attorney General Wickersham indicated today that there was a strong likelihood of a rehearing being asked of the Supreme Court in the "patent monopoly" case decided yesterday by a divided bench.

The government, not being a party to the suit, can act only through the defeated parties. The rehearing would be asked on the ground that a full bench had not passed on the case.

Several bills to curb the monopolizing power of patentees over unpatented articles used in operating patent machines began to show life today in Congress. Some old bills were revived and the new ones drafted in response to the appeal of Chief Justice White of the Supreme Court for Congress to change the law which a majority of the Court yesterday found gave patentees practically unrestricted privileges regarding the manner in which their patents may be used.

COURT DECIDES AGAINST PACKERS; TRIAL MUST GO ON

Plea of the Beef Trust to Have Cases Taken From Chicago Jury Is Denied.

CHICAGO, March 12.—United States District Judge Carpenter today decided to take from the jury the case of the ten Chicago packers charged with conspiracy in maintaining a combination in restraint of trade under the Sherman law and discharge the defendants.

The Court denied the motion of the defense after five days of argument by counsel. The ruling of Judge Carpenter means that the jury which has been listening to testimony introduced by the Government since Dec. 26 will finally pass on the question of the packers' guilt or innocence.
