

ALLENS CANNOT ESCAPE; SURRENDER IS NOW ADVISED

Sidna Edwards Says It is All Up and Fugitives Might as Well Give in to Police.

WILL SOON BE JAILED.

Hillsville People Expect They Will All Be Rounded Up in a Few Days.

HILLSVILLE, Va., March 25.—A certain eager anticipation on the part of the detectives and a plain expectancy on the faces of the men who make Hillsville their base in the hunt for the four Allen outlaws still at large indicate that the capture of the Allens within the next few days is expected.

Sidna Edwards, the captured member of the band, who is still held at Galax, the branch railroad terminus, sixteen miles from Hillsville, on his way to Roanoke jail, showed his despondent belief that the detectives were too strong for the under the little band of fugitives, with all their mountain craft.

"They might as well give up," he told his guard, "There ain't no use."

Edwards up to the very moment of his capture was faintly certain the law would never get him. But he has learned something of the resourcefulness and thoroughness of the work of the Hillsville and its machine.

ALLEN INVITED THE SLEUTH IN OUT OF RAIN.

Jack Allen, in another way, made similar acknowledgment last night. Sidna Edwards son, Friel, is out with the hunt of men with a price of \$500 on his head. Detective Winstler had been assigned to watch the Jack Allen house, since it was learned that Allen made a trip into the mountains on Saturday. It rained pitchforks last night. In the midst of the downpour Jack Allen opened the door and, standing tall in the light, shouted to Winstler.

"Come on in," he shouted to the detective. "You can watch me just as well in here and be a sight more comfortable."

The detective accepted. When the Allen under cases came up tomorrow before the adjourned term of court they will be put over until mid-April. Under the Virginia law there is no need for a change of venue; if a fair jury cannot be secured in the county where court is held any other county in the state may be required to furnish a panel of takersmen to go to Carroll County.

Friday morning when Lee Felts, brother of Tom Felts, the detective who captured Sidna Edwards, captured Sidna Edwards in the moonshining settlement at Lumburg, over in a blow of the moonshiner's head, the detective who captured Sidna Edwards before they became outlaws with blood money offered for them, he said frankly that there was no hope of capturing Sidna Allen, Claude Allen and Wesley Edwards before Monday or Tuesday.

Felts has charge of the business of the firm in the Virginia coal fields. The situation in the mines is uneasy because of strike talk. Since March 14, when Judge Massey, Prosecutor Foster, Sheriff Webb, Juror Powell and three others were mortally shot after Floyd Allen had been sentenced to a year in jail, the whole force of the detective bureau has been bent on the effort to catch the murderers. All other business has been suspended. The best men of the agency, along the whole line of the Alleghenies and the Blue Ridge from Georgia to Southern Pennsylvania, men trained to the running down of moonshiners and mountain outlaws, have been sent to Hillsville. Lee Felts said recently that he could count on his fingers the hours of sleep he had enjoyed between March 14 and March 22.

"At last," he said, "I have got a chance to go down and attend to the business that is piled up on my desk at Blacksburg." Blacks is the headquarters of the coal division.

"Aren't you afraid," he was asked, "that you will miss the last stand of the Allens while you are away?"

"Wouldn't go," he said shortly. "If there was the slightest chance of it, I'd be in plenty of time when I come back here Monday."

At that time Felts believed that all four Allens and some of their mountain allies were together waiting for the final battle somewhere not twenty miles from Fancy Gap. More definite information has been received by Dan Baldwin since then and he thinks, though he is not sure, that Sidna Allen is trying to make his way out of the mountains alone, believing that his nephews will fare better if he is not with them and that alone he has a fair chance to get to a place where he is not known and begin life over again.

Holen, counsel for Floyd Allen at the trial which terminated in the murders, has kept it out of the chronicles until now. The Judge is an imposing figure of a man. Of heroic stature, he yet has a generous girth, disproportionate to his height. He looks to weigh—but President Taft has said no gentleman weighs over 200 pounds, and Judge Holen is first of all a gentleman. He has the florid complexion of a man who knows the good things of life and wears a white beard of military type. Full of Virginia savvy, the merest stranger has only to catch his eye to be greeted with a sweeping salutation, which is in itself the equivalent of being welcomed to the whole community.

Floyd Allen, over in Roanoke jail, first told of the incident, but it reached Hillsville and Judge Holen has confirmed it. His version is about as follows:

"When the shooting began I was seated beside my client on the raised off platform in the middle of the courtroom. As soon as I perceived there was to be a general engagement I appreciated the fact that for a man of my size to remain standing or even sitting was to extend an all too expansive bulwark against stray bullets, accordingly I dropped to the floor and extended myself face downward. It was a providential thought, for the shooting soon concentrated on my client, Mr. Allen. In a moment he was struck and fell. He rolled over, writhing, I suppose in great pain, until he rolled against me. Mr. Good and one or two other persons whose individuality I did not remark at the time at once lowered their range and began shooting at him on the floor. This rendered my situation perilous indeed.

"For God's sake, Floyd," I said to him, "get away from me. Don't you see they are likely to kill me trying to get you?"

"You can say what you like, Floyd Allen is a gentleman at heart. He grabbed a chair, pulled himself to his feet, straddled the railing and ran out of the courtroom."

HILLSVILLE IS "SOME OUT OF THE WAY." It is to be remembered that the strain of mounting a horse a few moments later caused Floyd Allen such pain that he fainted and fell to the ground and was easily captured.

GIRLS CAN MAKE ROWDY MASHERS TAKE THE COUNT

Miss Ai Kishi Illustrates How Little Women May Down Big Men.

"All American girls should know some of the principles of jiu jitsu. By a little practice they can learn to overpower or disable almost any man who attacks them."

So said Little Miss Ai Kishi, the fourteen-year-old Jap girl who appears in the jiu jitsu wrestling act at the circus. As she and Prof. Tamaki posed for The Evening World photographer to illustrate some of the simpler holds and tricks of the ancient Japanese art, Miss Kishi is only 4 feet 3 inches tall and weighs only 110 pounds, but she can throw a man twice her weight.

The series of pictures published today illustrates the disposition of a street masher, who advances as though to shake hands. The girl turns to face him as he comes forward, and, if necessary, she may offer to shake hands in

order to draw him into the position shown in picture No. 1. His right hand must be extended and his right foot advanced.

In the second picture the girl has grasped the man's hand in both of hers, and with a quick twist has turned his palm inward to his left.

In picture No. 3 Miss Kishi has thrown her right foot swiftly across her assailant's ankle, at the same time pressing outward and downward against his twisted right wrist. The man is thrown instantly off his balance and nothing can save him from a hard fall flat on his back.

In picture No. 4 Miss Kishi, still holding her victim's hand and wrist, has dropped to a kneeling position, with her left knee pressed into the man's armpit, and is in position to bend his wrist until it snaps.

DIX HAS NOT DECIDED ON EXTRA SESSION CALL. Will Wait to See Effect of Two Special Messages He Will Send to Legislature.

ALBANY, March 25.—There are certain matters affecting the public interest in which I am deeply interested," said Gov. Dix today in response to a question as to whether or not he would call an extraordinary session of the Legislature, provided action was not taken on certain legislation before sine die adjournment next Friday.

"I cannot tell what I will do," continued the Governor, "until the Legislature has indicated what it will do. It will be the last day of the session before I can speak definitely upon this subject."

The Governor plans to send to the Legislature early this week a special message urging action upon the so-called "Primary Bill." He also will send a special message on conservation legislation unless action is taken by the Legislature on this proposition to-night or to-morrow.
