

# TAXICAB BANDIT IS SENT TO THE PEN

Splaine Sentenced to Between Seven and Fourteen Years for \$25,000 Robbery.

But seven prisoners were disposed of yesterday in the Courts of General Sessions. All were sentenced to prison. One of those sentenced was Eugene Splaine, one of the taxicab robbers, who was given an indeterminate sentence because he had never served a term before in a penal institution, despite the fact that he has been twice before convicted.

The penalties imposed were:  
**BY JUDGE MULQUEEN.**  
 Henry Adams, twenty-eight years old, tried and convicted of grand larceny. One year conviction. Penitentiary one year.

**BY JUDGE SWANN.**  
 Eugene Splaine, twenty-eight years old, one of gang that stole \$25,000 in taxicab robbery of bank messengers, pleaded guilty to robbery in the first degree. Two prior convictions in Boston State Prison not less than seven years and six months and not more than fourteen years and six months.  
 Samuel Zimmerman, twenty-four years old, pleaded guilty to grand larceny. Three prior convictions. State prison one year and ten months.  
 Thomas Kearney, eighteen years old, and Ed and Smith, twenty-two years old, both pleaded guilty to burglary in the third degree. Both second offenders. Both State prison not less than two years and six months and not more than four years and six months.

**IN BROOKLYN COURTS.**  
**BY JUSTICE CRANE.**  
 Bernard Green, twenty-nine years old, of No. 122 Clinton street, plumber, indicted for forger of paper worth \$100; first offense; sentence suspended.  
 Morris Freedman, a driver, indicted for assault in the third degree for cutting Isaac Wax in a fight; sentence suspended.  
 Benjamin Smith, allowed to plead guilty of petit larceny, was fined \$100 and sent to jail for ten days.  
 Charles Incorvans, pleaded guilty of carrying a concealed weapon; \$50 fine or ten days in jail.  
 Nicole Grecco, assault, second degree, twenty-nine days in jail.  
 Harry Edelman, burglar, third degree; sentence suspended.  
 Daniel Fraella, slipped through an open window into a drug store and pleaded guilty of petit larceny. Sentence suspended.  
 Richard Twigen Jr., Harry C. Wilson and Benjamin Smith, colored boys, indicted for grand larceny and convicted of petit larceny for stealing an automobile for a joy ride in which they collided with and overturned a milk

wagon, were sentenced to pay \$100 fine each or go to jail for ten days.

**BY JUDGE BAKER.**  
 Tony Zita, assault, second degree, Elmira Reformatory.

**BY JUDGE FAWCETT.**  
 Ernest Stevens, No. 25 State street, and twenty years old, who had been a regular attendant in the County Court on the weekly sentence day, was before the bar charged with burglarizing the apartment of Mrs. Sarah Murray, No. 16 Hiram street, and stealing \$1, a gold watch and bracelet. He pleaded guilty of an attempt, and was sent to the Elmira Reformatory.

John Hanson, a lonshoreman, sixty years old, for an assault on a young girl of ten years; two and one-half to four and one-half years in Sing Sing. John Roman and Joseph Jacobo, river pirates, were let off with an alternative sentence of \$500 fine or one year in the penitentiary each for robbing boats.

Joseph Nathaniel, assault, second degree; eleven months and twenty-nine days and \$500 fine or to remain in the penitentiary one day for each dollar unpaid.

William McLane and Nicholas Schaff, pleading guilty of petit larceny and offering to return the \$50 they had stolen, were let off with a fine of \$75.  
 Herman Kahl, one of a gang of day burglars, got a suspended sentence on promising to return \$120 to the man he stole it from.

George Wolfarth was sent to Elmira on pleading guilty of attempted burglary.

William Brown, assault, and Edward O'Neil, burglary, were sent to Elmira.

David Miller, alias Saran, robbed the house of Lillian Feinberg, No. 89 Powell street, March 7. He pleaded guilty of burglary, third degree, and was sent to the penitentiary for one year.

Albert Hughes and Bernard Williams,

assault, third degree; one year in the penitentiary.

**BY JUDGE TALLMADGE.**  
 Marcus J. Northbrooke, sixty-seven years old, and a veteran criminal of many sentences, "skipped" his bail four years ago, but was caught ten days ago. He gave up the fight and pleaded guilty of having worked an ingenious swindle as a pretended fire insurance agent. It is difficult to get insurance on Coney Island property, and the rates are enormously high. Northbrooke claimed to represent one of the most powerful fire insurance companies which would take Coney Island risks at remarkably low premiums. He wrote policies on half Coney Island's tinder-box buildings before he was found out. County Judge Tallmadge sent him back to Sing Sing for four and a half years, accepting his plea as of a first offender. He has spent thirteen of the last twenty years there.

The same Judge sentenced Louis Bosart Jr. to not less than one year nor more than three and a half years in Sing Sing on his conviction of black-mailing a friend of his family.  
 Frank Conlin, twenty-two years old, got fifteen months in Sing Sing for assault in the second degree.

**Auto Burned on the Drive.**  
 A taxicab driven by Thomas Foley of No. 167 Wilkins avenue, the Bronx, and carrying a man and woman passenger, caught fire early to-day at Riverside Drive and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street. Policeman Fraley sent in an alarm, but the car was practically destroyed. The passengers and Foley were unhurt.
