

FOLLOWS THUGS AFTER A HOLD-UP; LANDS ALL FOUR

Henry Fox Feigns Unconsciousness and Then Turns Detective on East Side.

Knocked down, beaten, robbed and chased into apparent unconsciousness, Henry Fox, a cigar dealer of No. 19 Bowers street, followed his four assailants through the Bowery early today and landed them in a police station. A motorman played an important role in the arrest, carrying a witness from a policeman to a lieutenant and contributing materially to the capture of the thugs.

The robbers got only fifteen cents from their victim, overlooking the fact which he had concealed on him. Because they couldn't find the real money they beat him up.

The assault and robbery took place in a blind alley running off First street, east of the Bowery. The men were lying in wait for their victim, and he was passing the little alley with the witness and pulled him into the darkness. They beat him while the others fished his pockets. Finding only the fifteen cents, they beat him up. Fox feigned unconsciousness and the thugs left him.

The injured man arose as soon as they got out of the alley and started on their path. The men divided into couples and short distance away and Fox followed one pair all over the east side until they again met their companions at Bowery street and the Bowery. There Fox saw Policeman Thayer and told him of the hold-up. Thayer had just left Lieut. Quirk and he told a motorman on a Third Avenue car to overhaul the lieutenant and send him back to the scene. The four men remained talking and Thayer, and Fox kept a watch on them. They sauntered toward the quartet and Lieut. Quirk and Policeman Harley looked in sight Thayer placed them under arrest.

One of the thugs bolted. Leaving the others to look after the trio, Thayer dashed after him, chasing him to Broadway before making the capture.

The men gave the names of Walter Bronberger, twenty-one years of age, a machinist, living at No. 26 East Ninth street; Harry Reimer, twenty-two years, a newsdealer, No. 23 Bowery; Joseph McMahon, twenty-four years, a clerk of No. 30 East Forty-eighth street, and Joseph Vito, a newsdealer of No. 12 Bowery. Fox identified all four of his assailants and each was charged with assault and robbery.

SHE GOT BULLET, NOT THE SANDWICH SHE LONGED FOR

Mrs. Weinach Said She Was Wounded While "Larking" With Husband.

As a young woman staggered from her room at No. 23 West Forty-fourth street shortly before 2 o'clock this morning with a bullet wound in her right shoulder and collapsed in the arms of Mrs. Easton, who runs the house, she murmured, "I—I shot myself."

She was taken to Flower Hospital by Dr. Anderson and reported to the police that she herself fired the shot while "larking" with her husband.

To the police she described herself as Mrs. Bertha Cohen, twenty-five. At the Forty-fourth street house, where she and the man have roomed together about a month, she was known as Mrs. Weinach and he as John Weinach. She has a seven-year-old daughter and the man a daughter eleven years old, and yesterday they visited the children at the convent where they are at school.

About 1 o'clock loud talking was heard in the room the couple occupied, and it would be distinguished that the woman wanted to go out for a sandwich and the man would not let her. Then the report of the revolver was heard. The weapon was found on the floor.

When the police arrived the man had disappeared. As he is believed to have been in the room at the time of the shooting the police are trying to find him that he may tell his story of the affair.

300 Homeless by Fire.
HARRISBURG, Pa., April 12.—More than two hundred and fifty persons were made homeless by a fire which destroyed twelve tenement houses in the foreign quarter of Steelton early today. Many of the homeless, who kept their savings in their rooms, lost everything. Two women were seriously hurt by falling walls.
