

# GIRL DETECTIVE HELPS ROUND UP BURGLAR GANG

Trails For Blocks Man Who She Found Had Robbed Her Home.

Through Marie Rohn, a fourteen-

year-old school girl, detectives rounded up a gang early to-day that is suspected of having obtained \$40,000 in Bronx burglaries during the past several months. They have six prisoners and several trunks and suitcases filled with loot.

After attending Normal School yesterday Miss Rohn returned to her home, No. 40 East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, and was nearly knocked down the steps by a man who rushed down the street. She discovered that her home had been robbed, and, running to the street, saw the man half a block away. She trailed him to One Hundred and Fiftieth street and Elton avenue and notified Policeman Frazier.

The policeman grabbed the man and took him to the Morrisania police station. He said he was George Burke, twenty-three, but refused his address.

According to the police he admitted robbing the Rohns, after several pieces of jewelry found in his pockets were identified by Marie as belonging to her family.

In his hurry to leave the Rohn house the burglar left a small memorandum book behind. On the outside was written Burke's name. It had an alphabetical index and on several pages were found names of persons whose homes have recently been robbed, so the police said.

The book also contained a list of valuables taken from each place and the names of pawnbrokers who had bought or loaned money on the articles.

Opposite some of the names in the book was written the time the families could be found at home. Under the dates of last Saturday and last Wednesday were recorded two robberies which took place on those days.

The police were able to get little sat-

isfaction out of the prisoner about the book. They sent to him a man and woman who posed as burglar victims and told Burke they would give anything to get back priceless heirlooms that had been stolen from them. They told such a pitiful story Burke relented and told them, according to the detectives, that they might recover their valuables by going to an address he gave them. It was No. 20 East Sixteenth street.

Detectives Heney, Wickham and Flynn went to the place at 3 o'clock this morning and found it a rooming house kept by Mrs. Lydia Derman. They say they went upstairs after seeing several suspicious looking men go in. A man called himself Dominick Mauro, twenty-eight, answered their knocks, but saying everybody else had moved during the day, slammed the door.

The detectives went in a rear door and arrested five men, who described them-

selves as Emanuel Accolina, twenty-six, a barber; Michael Carporale, twenty-nine, a laborer; Charles Silver, alias Moore, thirty-five, a laborer; Tony Milano, twenty-four, a barber; and Mauro. The latter, who he saw the detectives going in, ran downstairs and jumped into the bed of the landlady, who had run up when she heard the commotion. When she returned to her room and saw a man in the bed she screamed.

All the men gave detentions addresses. Mrs. Derman said they had roomed there for a week and she knew nothing of them.

The police say they found in this man's rooms three or four trunks and half a dozen suit cases filled with plunder worth many thousand dollars. There was a gold-headed umbrella stolen from Mrs. F. Berlach, No. 62 East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, six weeks ago, when \$1,200 worth of property was stolen. There were fifty pawn tickets and two opium outfits besides a quantity

of opium and cocaine.

The prisoners were locked up in the East Twenty-second street station and it is expected much of the loot will be identified to-day.
