

TWO MEN DYING ONE DEAD AFTER REVOLVER FIGHT

Stagger for Block, Firing Until
All Three Fall and Are
Unable to Rise.

ONE A "GANG" LEADER.

All Taken to Harlem Hospital
Where Man "Who Began
It" Dies.

Two men were walking north along
Second avenue at 9 o'clock last night
when at One Hundred and Fourteenth
street a third man stepped from a
doorway, drew a revolver and fired.

The two men stood close together.
One of them drew a revolver and re-
turned the fire. The man who began
the fight, a bullet in his stomach. As
he fell he handed the revolver to his
companion, and the latter continued to
shoot until a bullet entered the pit of
his stomach and he fell.

No close was he to his wounded com-
panion that he reached over and handed
him back the revolver, and the latter
fired again at his assailant. The
latter approached close to them and
fired a bullet into the back of one of
them, then fell and, flat on his stomach,
he died again.

All three men got to their feet, and
firing at intervals, they staggered to
Third avenue. The man who had re-
ceived the bullets in his back and
stomach had the revolver, but he was
fast losing strength. He passed it back
to his companion as he staggered and
fell in a heap in the gutter.

The lone man also was shot in the
stomach and was staggering. He turned
as though to walk off when a bullet
entered his back and again he keeled
over, but he was quickly on his feet. He
walked south along the avenue, turned
west into One Hundred and Thirteenth
street and reached Lexington avenue,
where he fell.

ALL TO HOSPITAL IN THE SAME AMBULANCE.

Dr. De Sautele came from Harlem
Hospital. The two men who lay at One
Hundred and Fourteenth street and
Third avenue said they were Charles
Baries of No. 249 East One Hundred and
Thirteenth street, alias Kid Baker, and
leader of the Kid Baker gang, and Jo-
seph Polster of No. 214 East One Hun-
dred and Seventh street. Baries had a
bullet in his stomach and another in his
back. Polster was shot through the
left side. The bullet punctured the lung.

No one knew where the third man was
until a boy ran up and said that a man
was at One Hundred and Thirteenth
street and Lexington avenue, and that
he had a revolver in his hand. The
police went there and found Vincenzo
Morrello, who lived in the same house
with Polster. His wounds were almost
identical with those of Baries. Morrello
is serving a twenty-five-year sentence in
prison for counterfeiting.

The three men were taken to the
hospital in the same ambulance. There
the doctors said there was "not a chance
of a thousand" for any of them to re-
cover. The shooting was the result of
a gang feud, the police say. Morrello
died early this morning.

WOMAN SHOT BY PISTOL HUSBAND BAND INVENTED.

A few minutes before the police were
called to this fight the reserves ran to
No. 127 East One Hundred and Second
street, where a great crowd had assem-
bled, following the report that a woman
had been shot to death.

In the house the police found Mrs.

Elizabeth Stires, twenty-eight, a bullet
wound in her shoulder. She said that
she had been accidentally shot by her
husband, Jacob.

Stires has been working on an inven-
tion of a small revolver, which he be-
lieved would be adopted by bank mes-
sengers and others who carry large
sums of money. The scheme suggested
itself to him after the taxicab robbery
and last night his revolver was per-
fected.

He called his wife in to show it to
her and displayed it proudly when it
was exploded and Mrs. Stires fell. At
Harlem Hospital it was said that she
would recover.

Gang Beats a Policeman Uncon-
scious for Grabbing Them On.

Patrick McGowan, a policeman at-
tached to the West Forty-seventh street
station, was attacked by six men last
night at Forty-seventh street and Tenth
avenue. The policeman had ordered
the men off a corner and they attacked
him. After knocking him down and kick-
ing him, one of them took his night-
stick and beat him senseless. McGo-
wan was taken to the station house,
where he was treated for a fractured
nose and other injuries.


