

WHAT PROBABLY HAPPENED ON THE TITANIC

Capt. Dow of the Carmania Doubts Whether There Was Much Panic.

CRASH MUSTERS CREW. How Lifeboats Are Manned and Measures for Safety Are Taken.

In the absence of any authentic information as to what happened on the Titanic after she struck the iceberg and in the four-hour interval before she sank, the best information as to what probably occurred must come from a man familiar with the perils of transatlantic travel. Such a man is Capt. David Dow, the veteran skipper of the Carmania, who brought his vessel into this port on Sunday after guiding her safely through the ice fields that wiped out the Titanic on her maiden trip.

PROBABLY THERE WAS NOT MUCH OF A PANIC.

Adapt to-day what occurs aboard any big liner in a collision and what, in a general way, must have been the scenes aboard the Titanic, Capt. Dow said he very seriously doubts whether there was a panic such as the ordinary mind pictures. To begin with, he points out that generally all aboard were Anglo-Saxons or of the Northern races of Europe, which are as a whole inclined to reasonable coolness in moments of stress. Furthermore, he said, under the present methods of meeting emergency officers and crew have things so well in hand that even in the gravest danger there is small possibility of such a panic as would interfere with such a rescue work as could be done.

THE COLLISION ITSELF WOULD MUSTER GREW TO QUARTERS.

"The first thing the captain would do would be to close the bulkheads. This can be done directly from the bridge by means of a hydraulic device, and in the case of the Carmania every bulkhead in the ship can be made airtight in less than one minute. Then the captain must trust to Providence whether they prove strong enough for the emergency and

successful in keeping the boat afloat in case a hole has been torn in her hull. HOW THE LIFEBOATS ARE MANNED AND LOADED.

"While the captain is closing the bulkheads from the bridge he may also proceed with directing the work of manning the lifeboats. Unless something should be very wrong the crew should already be stationed at the lifeboats, ready to swing out the davits and lower the boats the moment the captain decides his vessel is in danger of foundering. The moment the situation seems as grave as this the captain would order the boats lowered.

"In ordinary circumstances the passengers would be helped into the boats after they had been launched. On all the big liners now the lifeboats are so arranged that the work of launching and manning them is but a matter of seconds. Women and children first, of course, and then the male passenger should there be any room left. After the lifeboats are in the water and put off the life rafts are sent off. These are usually stored on ways directly back of the lifeboats, and the same davits may be used to launch the second fleet. In case the ship should have foundered rapidly, however, the rafts would still be of use, for while they might be drawn down into the water by the suction of the sinking vessel, they would immediately rise again and float.

"Meantime the 'O's' has been flashed, and even if there are more passengers aboard there would be little the captain could do save wait and hope for aid in answer to the distress signal."

PRECIPITATE MEN WOULD BE CLUBBED BACK.

Capt. Dow was asked what steps would be taken to prevent panic and what would be done if men attempted to enter the lifeboats before all the women and children had been cared for. He answered the latter question first, and quickly, "Club 'em back."

"There isn't the chance of panic that most folks would suppose," resumed the Captain. "For instance, how many people know how easily women are handled in times of danger? They are far more cool and reasonable than men generally, and they usually respond more quickly to the warning and instruction of the crew, such members of which as can be spared circulate constantly among the passengers while there is danger, helping them with their lifebelts and otherwise telling them what to do."

Capt. Dow was asked if in these days he thought it would ever be necessary for the captain and crew to swing their loaded revolvers in holsters outside the coat as warning, as sea tales describe wrecks. He said that it would be quite probable that the skipper and some of the higher officers would go to the bridge armed for any emergency, but that this means of quelling panicky passengers would be hardly necessary to-day even in the most hopeless crash.

New York Teacher Rescued?

ST. JOHN, N. B., April 17.—Elmer Young of St. John said to-day that his niece, Miss Emily Young, was a passenger on the Titanic. Miss Young is a graduate of Acadia University and a teacher of music in New York.

A Miss "Marie" Young, the only one of the name in the cabin list of the Titanic, is reported on the Carpathia.

Duke of Connaught Sends Message of Heartfelt Sympathy.
