

MORE SOUTHERLY COURSE ORDERED BY FRENCH LINE

PARIS, April 18.—French shipping circles believe the lesson learned from the disaster to the Titanic will show the necessity for an international agreement to put a stop to absurd competition for speed between Europe and New York, leading commanders of transatlantic steamships unconsciously to take chances that prudence would forbid.

There is also a conviction among shipping men that the speed of steamers should be reduced off Newfoundland.

In the mean time the French Transatlantic line has given orders to the captains of its steamers to take a more southerly course.

In the course of the meeting Mrs. Hewitt read the following telegram she had received from Gov. Dix: "The overwhelming grief and sorrow brought to the entire world by the sinking of the Titanic is assigned to a degree by the splendid and instantaneous response of the American people to the cry for succor and help."

It is a cause of satisfaction that the sympathy of the women of New York has been so far-reaching and concrete an expression in an organized movement to extend aid and comfort to the stricken survivors when they reach our shores, and especially to relieve the pressing needs of the unfortunate passengers who have lost their all.

"I regard it as a privilege to send to the Women's Relief Committee my heartfelt wishes for the success of their noble mission of love and mercy."

The London fund for the relief of the Titanic's victims, which was started yesterday by the Lord Mayor of London, totalled \$100,000 at 6 o'clock this evening, London time.

SISTERS OF CHARITY AND TRAINED NURSES ON DUTY.

The Women's Relief Committee have arranged to have a private compartment set aside for Sisters of Charity and trained nurses on the Cunard line pier. Ten Sisters of Charity and ten trained nurses have already been designated to post themselves in this room this evening and get ready for their relief work. Truckloads of hamper and clothing which has been furnished to the committee will be driven to the pier and taken charge of by a special sub-committee.

The trained nurses and Sisters of Charity have been instructed to wait for the removal of the first and second-class passengers from the Carpathia and then to go aboard and direct the work of relieving the injured stowage passengers. Every charitable home in the city has been in communication with the Women's Relief Committee during the day and offered to house and care for the injured, sick and destitute stowage passengers.

The Women's Committee sent the following telegram to President Taft: "The New York City Women's Relief Committee, to aid the stowage survivors of the Titanic, extend to the President of the United States their aid to supplement the work of the Government and of the immigration authorities at the Port of New York. The women of the committee also extend to the President their sincerest sympathy in the loss of his military secretary, Major Butt."

Mrs. Abram S. Hewitt was elected honorary president of the committee. Mrs. Nelson H. Henry, who was appointed Chairman and Treasurer of the Finance Committee, will be assisted by Mrs. Charles B. Alexander, Mrs. Henry P. Dimock, Mrs. James Herman Aldrich, Mrs. Sidney Dillon Ripley and Mrs. E. H. Harriman. Mrs. Aldrich will receive money contributions at her home, No. 159 West Fifty-ninth street.

POPE'S MESSAGE LOST.

ROME, April 18.—A mission from the Vatican to the President of the United States was ended by death when Archbishop Butt, military aide to the President, went to the bottom with the Titanic. The Vatican announced today that a letter which was lost with Butt had been received by the President.

The Pope also announced that he had sent to the President his condolences on the death of Major Butt, and had received an acknowledgment from Washington.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT WIRES MESSAGE OF SYMPATHY TO TAFT

OTTAWA, Ont., April 18.—His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught, today sent the following message to President Taft at Washington: "I have delayed telegraphing to you in the hope that Major Butt might still

be among the saved, but fear there is now no hope. Accept the expression of my deepest sympathy upon this gallant officer's tragic end and the loss to yourself of a devoted member of your staff. I also take this opportunity of assuring you of my heartfelt sympathy with the United States in the loss of so many of its citizens through the awful catastrophe of the sinking of the Titanic.
