ALMOST WRECKED GOING TO AID SHIP SUNK IN ICY SEAS

Before the Romsdel Could Reach Her, Steamer Sank With All Aboard.

Almost a wreck herself, the Romsdel, a 1,400-ton freighter which left Bergen, Norway, March 14, bound for New York and the West Indies with cargo, has reached this port with tales of thrilling experiences while trying to aid a steamship that was overwhelmed in the ice floes March 26. The Romsdel has twelve large holes in her hull and the ends of her propellers snapped off. Before she could get close enough to identify her, the wrecked vessel disappeared beneath the ice, taking down with her all aboard. In latitude 46.5, longitude 67.10, about 60 miles north of where the Titanic disaster occurred, the Romsdel saw a steamer of about 8,000 tons fast in the

floes and sending up rocket signals for help. Capt. E. A. Hole headed his ship for her at once with all speed. The Romsdel had not got far before her hull was stove in. Nineteen men had to be put on the pumps, and soon she was heeled fast in the ice herself. Though temporary repairs were made, the crew had to remain at the pumps until the Romsdel reached Lewisburg, Cape Breton, N. S. She is now at the Morse dry docks, Brooklyn, for extensive repair. The Romsdel belongs to G. H. Skogland & Co. of Alesund, Norway, and usually brings salt to New

York and the West Indies and takes back fruit. Shipping men here believed today that the steamer in distress which the Romsdel tried to succor in the ice fields may have been the Augsburg of the German-Australian line. This belief was based on a despatch from Plymouth, England, received today, which said that the Hamburg-American line steamship Ypiranga had reported upon her arrival there the receipt of a wireless

message from Cape Race last Saturday to the effect that the Augsburg was drifting helplessly off the Newfoundland banks within 100 miles of the place where the Titanic subsequently foundered. The Ypiranga turned from her course eastward and made a fruitless search all of Saturday night and Sunday morning. Then she resumed her eastward course, only to pick up late Sunday night the wireless call for help from the

Titanic. She was then 30 miles away from the Titanic's position and unable to be of aid. **The First Step.** (From the Detroit Free Press.) "What started you on the road to success?" "By getting it into my head early in life that if I wanted money I'd have to get busy and get it."
