

GIRLS' ASSAILANT TO PAY PENALTY UNDER NEW LAW

Judge Dike Imposes Prison Term and Sends Convict to Sterilization Board.

Judge Dike, in the County Court, Brooklyn, to-day, in passing sentence upon Louis Martinson, fifty-two years old, of No. 51 Third street, who was convicted of attacking two girls, one fourteen years old and the other sixteen, descended Martinson, and said he would turn him over to the Board of Sterilization, which is soon to be organized by Gov. Dix.

Judge Dike applied the law, which has just been passed, on one reported to be a young girl from men of Martinson's caliber. The fourteen-year-old girl, who accused Martinson, is soon to become a mother.

Judge Dike, in sentencing Martinson to prison for two and a half to five years, said:

"You have not been frank with me. There are not alone those girls who have testified against you, but we have knowledge of others. If these acts were committed with the knowledge of your wife, we don't know. I have asked you to give me the address of your wife, and you have told me you don't know where she is.

"Such crimes as this and the painful circumstances surrounding them come to the attention of this court from time to time. When a man of your age perpetrates such wrongs against young girls there is nothing left for them but the downward path.

"A law passed this year, which the Governor has signed, provides for what has already been adopted in New Jersey and five other States. This law demands that certain men convicted of certain crimes should come under the scrutiny of the Board of Sterilization soon to be appointed by the Governor.

"The law, known as the Law of Sterilization, gives the executive of this State the power to appoint this board. I shall submit you to that board for what you have done.

"Lawyers discussing the merits of the new Sterilization law expressed the opinion that Martinson had been sentenced and was innocent from any action against him by the board, because he had been convicted of assault in the second degree. Under the new law a defendant, they claim, has to be convicted of assault in the first degree before he can be committed to the attention of the Board of Sterilization.
