

WIRELESS WILSON LIVED AT WALDORF AT \$60,000 A YEAR

Convicted Head of United
Co. Comes From Atlanta to
Testify in Bankruptcy.

When the bankruptcy trustee brought against Col. Christopher Wilson, who is serving a term in Atlanta for his work in the United Wireless Company, was begun today before United States Commissioner Alexander in the Federal Building. Wilson, who was brought here for the purpose, this time seems to explain his financial condition for the last five years.

Wilson appeared here the worse for the night months he has spent in prison. He professed his memory was failing him when it came to financial matters more than two years back. Mr. Wilson began by probing into the real and personal property owned and controlled by Col. Wilson in the last four years.

"How much money in your possession or under your control?" Mr. Myers asked.

"I have only a few dollars," replied Wilson.

"How much money did you receive from the sale of United Wireless?"

"Between \$200,000 and \$300,000."

"What was your interest in the New York selling agency?"

"I had no interest in it," he answered.

"How much did you spend in a year for living expenses?"

"I do not remember," he said.

"Did you speculate in stocks?"

"I do not remember," he said.

was a good loser. I have not dealt in stocks since 1909.

Q. Have you given your present wife any money? A. Not as much as I wish I could have given her. In the past six months I probably paid her \$150.

Q. How much have you paid her in the last two years? A. Oh, as much as she needed.

Col. Wilson said he had transferred stock in the Wilson Mining Company to each of his children before his arrest, and said it was possible that he might have transferred some since. He said that he had transferred 1,200 shares of the stock to his wife about a month after their marriage in August, 1910.

VETERAN DRUGGIST IS KILLED BY A FALL.

Gustav Ramberger, for Many Years an Invalid, Tumbles From Window of Home.

Gustav Ramberger, a retired druggist, eighty-eight years old, who until thirty years ago ran a string of drug stores in this city and for twenty-five years has been an invalid, fell from his bedroom window on the sixth floor at No. 64 Central Park West about 4 o'clock this morning and was killed.

Mr. Ramberger, who lived with his niece, Miss Julia Trout, it is supposed, went to close the window and lost his balance.

William Woodley, a neighbor, saw the body falling into the airway and called the janitor, Bernard Schwartz. They carried him in and sent in a call for an ambulance from the J. Hood Wright Hospital. He was dead when it arrived.
