

ISMAY SUBSCRIBES \$50,000 TO PENSION SAILORS' WIDOWS

Duff-Gordon Says 'Go Away' When Asked Why He Let Many Drown.

LIVERPOOL, May 12.—J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the White Star Line, has contributed \$50,000 and Mrs. Ismay \$5,000 as the nucleus of a fund which Mr. Ismay suggests the Earl of Derby, Lord March of Liverpool, should initiate in order to provide pensions for the widows of seamen who lost their lives while serving in vessels of the British mercantile marine.

Sir Cosmo and Lady Duff-Gordon, survivors of the Titanic, arrived from New York today on the Lusitania. Sir Cosmo declined to discuss the stories regarding their escape from the sinking liner.

Questioned about the testimony of Hendrickson, who said Sir Cosmo refused to let the lifeboat put back to rescue drowning people, Sir Cosmo said:

"Go away and do not bother me!"

CALIFORNIAN CAPTAIN TRIED TO TALK TO UNIDENTIFIED SHIP.

LONDON, May 14.—In the Board of Trade's Titanic inquiry, Capt. Stanley Lord of the Leyland Line, California certified to-day that at 11 o'clock on the night of April 14 he saw the lights of an unidentified vessel and tried to communicate with her by Morse lamp signals, but received no reply. The second officer, Capt. Lord said, reported that he saw a white rocket at 11:15.

After hearing evidence on the Californian's position Lord Marney, interrupting, said:

"Apparently the Titanic was then only fifteen miles distant."

Capt. Lord denied that the third officer told him it was a passenger ship and said he did not know the Titanic's position. Capt. Lord said he did not believe the reported rocket was a distress signal and was positive that the vessel whose lights he saw was not the Titanic.

The other officers of the Californian were sent out of court during the examination of Capt. Lord, at the request of Sir Rufus Isaacs.

Capt. Lord said that both the apprentice and the second officer, who were on the bridge during the night, told him in the morning that they had called him during the night and had reported that a vessel nearby had been firing rockets and that he had answered their signals.

He himself, however, could not remember doing so and in the morning asked the second officer why he had not been called. The officer replied that he should have called the captain himself if he had thought that the rockets were distress signals. The second officer said emphatically that the lights were not distress signals.

Capt. Lord, in reply to his own counsel, said: "While it would be dangerous to go through ice, if I had known the Titanic was sinking I should certainly have done so, although I do not believe I could have reached her in time."

BLUECOAT SAVES A LIFE, NEARLY LOSES HIS OWN.

Dugan Leaped Into East River After Boat Captain Who Had Fallen.

Patrolman Robert Dugan of the Fulton street station, Brooklyn, all but lost his life early this morning in rescuing Capt. John Severn of the ash boat Etting from the East River. Capt. Severn, returning to his boat at the foot of Fulton street, lost his balance as he walked down the ladder connecting the barge with the pier. Dugan heard the cries of Watchman Wade, and, throwing off his coat, belt and hat as he ran, jumped into the water. He got severn to the side of the barge and managed to cling there until Wade could help both out. By that time Dugan was unconscious. Dr. Morrison took him to the Brooklyn Hospital after reviving him. Dugan is twenty-six, married and lives at No. 32 Forty-third street, South Brooklyn.

GEORGE BATSON IS DEAD.

Young Wall Street Man Had Been Close to E. H. Harriman.

The death of George Batson, a member of the Stock Exchange firm of Eugene Messer & Co., was announced today in the financial district. His death, though not a surprise, was a shock to members of his firm and his many associates in Wall street. Mr. Batson died in the New York Eye and Ear Infirmary last night as the result, it was stated, of an operation performed two months ago.

Mr. Batson's rise in Wall street was remarkable. Not yet thirty years old, he was considered one of the best authorities on railroad matters and had been in confidential relationship with the late E. J. Harriman. Soon after the death of the railroad king, Mr. Batson, at the solicitation of Mrs. Harriman, wrote a history of the life of Mr. Harriman.

Mr. Batson lived at No. 218 East Seventeenth street. He leaves widow and four young daughters.


