

### SAW MOTHER DIE IN BRIDLE PATH; GIRL NOW IN COMA

44-Year-Old Emma Knapp  
Lies in Critical State Following Park Tragedy.

The shock of seeing her mother, Mrs. Caroline Duncan Miller Knapp, killed before her eyes when the horse she was riding on the west bridge path in Central Park stumbled and fell upon her, has had a dangerous effect upon fourteen-year-old Emma W. Knapp, and it was said at her home, No. 6 East Fifty-fourth street, today that the child was in an alarming condition. During the night she sank into a profound coma from which she has not revived.

Wallace Percy Knapp, the bereaved husband, was also in the care of a physician at his home. Mr. Knapp is a well known corporation lawyer and stockman.

It was learned today that Mrs. Knapp was killed instantly when her mount fell upon her. The horse of her side saddle had penetrated her heart.

It was shortly after 6 o'clock when Mrs. Knapp, a beautiful woman of thirty-five and an expert horsewoman, left the Riding Club at No. 7 East Fifty-eighth street with her daughter. Both mother and daughter were mounted on small colored saddle horses. They entered the park at the west bridge path and were almost opposite Ninety-fourth street when the accident happened. Mrs. Knapp was slightly ahead of her daughter, riding at an easy canter, when her mount stepped in a hole and went down. The animal turned over, falling with all its weight on Mrs. Knapp and driving the horn of the saddle into her left breast.

The horse reared its weight on its rider only an instant then scrambled to its feet and galloped away. The child pulled up her mount and got down, but

when she reached her mother's side life was extinct. Several men who had witnessed the accident joined the child and summoned Patrolman John H. McLaughlin. The dead woman was carried to the Red Cross Hospital at Central Park West and One Hundredth street, where Dr. M. T. Munkittrick announced that death had come instantly when the horn of the saddle had pressed upon the young woman's breast, breaking several ribs and driving the shattered bone through the heart.

When the little girl learned that her mother was dead she became hysterical and was taken home in a taxicab, where her condition became more alarming. She passed from one outburst of hysterics to another and when her strength gave out she passed off into a deep coma.

Mr. Knapp was in New Haven when notified of his wife's death.

**FUGITIVE'S BAIL FORFEITED.**  
Disorderly House Owner Had Put Up \$2,000 Cash.

Justice Russell of Special Sessions today forfeited the \$2,000 cash bail bond of Wallace W. Sweeney, convicted last January of conducting a disorderly resort in West Thirty-first street, and sentenced him to the penitentiary for six months.

Sweeney, at the time of his conviction and sentence, furnished the bond pending a decision by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, which reviewed the case. That court a week ago decided his conviction was just, but detectives cannot locate him.

The principal evidence against Sweeney was that he permitted exhibitions of the turkey-trot, grizzly bear, nigger wiggle and bunny bug dances in his place.
