

MUSIC TOO WEIRD FOR NEIGHBORS OF NEW PICTURE SHOW

Big Crowd of Upper West-siders Makes a Vigorous Protest at City Hall.

The bedlam of a morning piano, clanging cymbals, a snare drum that arias and a base drum that wakens sleeping children—all manipulated by a weird musician of acrobatic skill—brought an entire neighborhood to the City Hall on Sunday protesting against the noise arising from a newly established moving picture show at No. 233 Broadway. So big was the crowd that it was necessary for James G. Wallace, Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, to use the Board of Estimate room.

It was described as a "hideous jumble of godless music" by Dr. W. C. Cuff of No. 27 West One Hundredth street. The show is an open air concern located between Ninety-ninth and One Hundredth street. It is fenced in from Broadway by a great circus-painted front—colors mostly red.

"We had lived in peace and in good will," said William Cunningham of No. 23 West Ninety-ninth street, to the Commissioner, "until the combined Ooney Island-Bowery invasion came. Its big red fences, its lights, its barkers, its crowds, the shouts of the patrons, the clamor of the alleged musical instruments operated by this musical monkey have upset the neighborhood and made residence there impossible."

Dr. W. W. Strong, No. 256 West One Hundredth street, also made a speech protesting against the show. The show is operated by Harris & Goldstone. Their attorney submitted what purported to be petitions signed by residents of the neighborhood favoring the show. During the reading, the documents several persons loudly proclaimed the signatures false.

Alderman Niles Becker, who sought to say a word in favor of the show, was howled down by the crowd.

Chief Wallace took the papers and reserved decision.

EX-POLICEMAN REFUSES TO TESTIFY BEFORE CORRIGAN.

Schuessler's Bond Forfeited and Case Referred to District Attorney.

Former Bicycle Police Sergeant and Medal Man John Schuessler, charged with assaulting Policeman Frederick Wolfshlag of the Westchester Police Station, failed to appear before Magistrate Corrigan for trial today and his bail of \$1,000 was declared forfeited and the case referred to the District Attorney. On May 6 Wolfshlag arrested Schuessler at Westchester avenue and Castle Hill, charging him with intoxication and driving a horse and wagon on the wrong side of the road.

What followed caused Wolfshlag to add to the original charges the following: Using abusive and profane language, disturbing the public peace, assault, threatening to kill, resisting arrest and attempting to escape. Wolfshlag charges that Schuessler dragged him from his mount and assaulted him. Wolfshlag applied his club and Schuessler was taken to Fyrdham Hospital, where he remained for two weeks with a possible fractured skull. Then Schuessler was arraigned before Magistrate Corrigan and held in \$1,000 bail for trial last Saturday. He failed to appear and Lieut. Mattala was ordered to produce him to-day.

Lieut. Mattala did not produce Schuessler. He brought the information that Schuessler would not appear before Corrigan because two years ago Corrigan had fined him \$10 for assaulting Policeman Miller.

EX-CONVICT, INTERPRETER OF COURT, IS HELD AGAIN.

Despite His Criminal Record, Dumas Held Official Job for Four Years.

Eugene O. Cyr Byron Dumas, who for four years was official interpreter in the Eighth District Municipal Court at One Hundred and Twenty-first street and Sylvan place, although he had served three terms for forgery in Boston, was arraigned in the Harlem Court today, charged with grand larceny. He waived examination and was held for trial in General Sessions.

A year ago Dumas was dismissed as court interpreter. Six months ago he was arrested for grand larceny and let go under a suspended sentence. The new charge is made by Eugene Gunn, of No. 23 East One Hundred and Thirtieth street. When Gunn arrived in New York from Italy two months ago his two children were deported because they were suffering from an eye disease. Dumas went to Gunn and said that for \$10 he could fix the immigration authorities so that the children would be brought back on the next boat. Gunn paid the money and waited. He lost patience yesterday and secured a warrant for Dumas' arrest.

POLICEMAN FATALLY HURT IN STOPPING MAD RUNAWAY.

Horse's Flying Forefeet Caught in Trailing Harness—Mount and Rider Thrown.

The flying forefeet of Hugo, Mounted Policeman Fred Plenge's horse, became entangled in the trailing

harness of a runaway at One Hundred and Seventy-third street and Jerome avenue to-day just as the policeman was scuttling off the runaway's hind. Horse and rider went down, rolling over the ground together. Hugo rose and whined shrilly, but the policeman lay unconscious. Bystanders who had witnessed part of the exciting chase telephoned for an ambulance. Dr. Forman of Fordham Hospital said the policeman had sustained a fractured skull, lacerations and contusions, and rushed him to the hospital.

The runaway, attached to an express wagon, became frightened at One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, racing north on Eighth avenue. At One Hundred and Fiftieth street the horse swerved, smashing the wagon against an elevated pillar and throwing the driver, Daniel Robbins, of No. 23 East Twenty-third street, who had clung to the reins. With harness trailing the animal continued on a gallop toward High Bridge. Three Policemen leaped at him, seizing the bridle, which broke. Mounted Policeman Plenge had seen the first attempt and shook Hugo like and imphish.
