

WOMEN LEAD MOB AGAINST TROOPS IN FRENCH RIOT

Dock Strikers Give Fight to Soldiers and Police in Streets of Havre.

HAVRE, France, July 5.—The strike of seamen and dock laborers which is spreading rapidly throughout France was accompanied late last evening by serious rioting here. A number of strikers took possession of a steamer and when driven off by the police gathered at the docks and met the police and a detachment of infantry which had been called to support them with showers of stones, and other missiles. Many of the soldiers and police were injured by bricks hurled from windows of houses in adjacent streets.

Among the ringleaders of the rioters were a number of women wearing red scarves.

The strikers were finally forced to retire, but retreated slowly, erecting barricades consisting of wagons and furniture in many of the streets. They broke all the windows in the two principal police stations of the city.

Military reinforcements arrived here early today from Rouen.

BORDEAUX, France, July 5.—The strike of the dockers here in sympathy with the seamen of other ports has been only partially effective. A fight occurred today between strikers and police on the arrival of the steamship Magellan from South America. Several policemen were hurt.

TURNED FROM DOORS, INJURED MAN DIES AFTER 20-MILE RIDE

Doctor Says Villagers Refused to Take in Patient Who Had Lost Legs.

(Special to The Evening World.) SOMERVILLE, N. J., July 5.—Because of the refusal of inhabitants of California to allow Edward List, whose legs were cut off by a train, to be taken into any of their homes in order that an attempt might be made to save his life by an operation, Dr. Edward H. Crystell of that village declares he was compelled to place the injured man in an automobile and make a midnight ride of twenty miles over the mountains to the Somerset Hospital here. List died from loss of blood and shock as he was being carried into the hospital. Dr. Crystell, who was exhausted from holding the injured man in his arms during the hard ride over the mountains, was put to bed in the hospital. List's body is now at the hospital.

List, who was the father of nine children, lived at Glen Gardner. He was run over at Califon by a Jersey Central train about 8 o'clock last night. Califon is a small hamlet in the German valley, which has no emergency hospital or other place to take

the injured. List's case needed prompt action to save his life. Dr. Crystell says he appealed to a number of residents within a reasonable distance of the railroad station, but they all refused to have List brought to their homes for an operation, although they were told his life depended on it. A locomotive running loose was flagged and Dr. Crystell pleaded with the engineer to carry the injured man to Easton. The engineer, it is said, replied that he could not take List aboard because he had no order from the railroad officials to do so. Dr. Crystell in desperation then made the ride to this place with his patient.

GET RICH QUICK CLERK HELD ON ROBBERY CHARGE.

Eliot Confesses He Stole to Play Tip Which Failed to Go Through.

Peter J. Eliot, the young accountant formerly in the employ of Marwick, Mitchell & Co., of No. 78 Wall street, who wanted to be a millionaire quickly and is alleged to have stolen \$40,000 worth of stocks to accomplish his design, appeared for arraignment in the Centre Street Court today. He was held in \$5,000 bail on a short affidavit, brought by Detectives Whelan and McLoughlin, and will appear again tomorrow for examination on the charge of robbery brought against him.

The detectives told Magistrate Corrigan that until the books of the Southern Iron and Steel Company of No. 24 Broad street had been thoroughly gone over they have no evidence against young Eliot but his own confession.

His ears had been too large, Eliot said. He had caught the tip that Long Acre Electric was going up. That was when he was making an inventory of the securities of the Southern Iron and Steel Company. He took some of

the firm's securities and disposed of them for \$3,000. This money he invested in the stock which went diamally downward. When the detective arrested him Eliot confessed that he was "cleaned."

Hurt While on Street Car. Orylle Van Vechten, of No. 37 Fairmount avenue, Brighton Heights, Staten Island, was seriously hurt today on an Eighth avenue car at Liberty street. The shafts of a wagon, the driver of which could not control his horse burst through the side of the car and struck him in the small of the back, injuring him so that the surgeons at the Hudson street Hospital said he had small chance for recovery.
