COTTON MILL STRIKE MAY THROW 25,000 OUT.

Weavers at New Bedford Threaten to Quit if "Grading" System Is Tried.

NEW BEDFORD, July 10.—New Bedford faces the possibility of a strike of weavers, which may close the cotton mills and throw 25,000 out of employ-

ment, as the result of action taken by the weaver's union last night.

Recently the cotton manufacturers posted notices announcing a system of grading soon to be put in operation. The weavers voted to notify the manufacturers that unless this notice is removed before noon Saturday they will not report for work next Monday.

The union's action has the endorsement of the Textile Council, which represents spinners, carders, loom fixers, twistors and engineers, as well as weavers.


