

CRIPPLE ESCAPES AS THREE DROWN IN RIVER CRASH

Motor Boat, Without Lights, Run Down by Freighter at Burlington, N. J.

ONE-ARMED MAN SAVED.

Tyler Got Board Under Chin and Kept Afloat, Comrades Sank.

BURLINGTON, N. J., Aug. 5.—None of the bodies of the three men lost in the motor boat Nancy has yet been recovered. Charles Tyler, the one-armed man who clung to a piece of wreckage until he was picked up with a sprained arm and back and broken ribs, is doing well to-day in hospital.

Tyler met Don John Scougon of Bristol, with two neighbors, George Vandine and Robert Hethington, in a hotel here Saturday night and all went for a moonlight cruise on the Delaware. As they were running without lights the Nancy was cut into and sunk by the freighter: John W. Garrett, about a mile below Burlington.

Telling the story to-day, Tyler said: "The owner of the boat (Scougon) was steering and was seated about three feet in front of me when we first saw the lights and the big black hull of the freight boat. He threw his wheel over, but the next instant we were struck almost amidships. The bow of the Garrett cut through the gunwales of the motor boat less than two feet from where I sat.

"The next I remember I was struggling in the water clutching a big board with my one hand. I got a grip with my chin on one side and my hand on the other and wrapped my leg around it. I clung to the plank and cried for help until some men came in a lifeboat and took me on board."

Capt. George Van Zandt, in command of the freighter, attributes the accident entirely to the fact that the small boat was running without lights and that its steersman appeared confused when he found himself in danger.

CAPTAIN TELLS STORY OF THE FATAL CRASH. "I was in my cabin but rushed on deck when I heard the clang of bells in the engine room," said Capt. Van Zandt to-day. "I met the watch and asked what the trouble was. 'My God, a little boat ran right under our bow and her men are out there in the water,' he exclaimed.

"At once I ordered a lifeboat lowered with Second Engineer William Hines in charge. I heard a man calling for help. He was right near the side of my boat, and I threw a life line in the direction of the voice and called out to the man to catch it. I'll never forget his answer. 'My hands are under water and the line is on my back. I can't reach it.' Then he sank. I suppose he was too weak to hold on to the rope. "Hines had directed the lifeboat toward a voice calling from the direction of the New Jersey shore. But closer to him he heard another voice crying: 'I've got only one arm and can't hold on much longer. Save me quick!' "Hines steered toward the crippled man and found Tyler clinging to the bottom board of the launch. We searched for an hour, but the other men had gone to the bottom."

121 LEAD POISON VICTIMS.

One hundred and twenty-one workmen in New York City have been poisoning from their occupations, according to a report made public yesterday by the American Association for Labor Legislation. Many of these poisonings were due to the absence of regulations requiring the use of simple protective devices and practices which, it is pointed out, are in general use in Germany and England under legislation providing for the payment of insurance benefits in the case of sickness directly due to industry.

RUNAWAY IN CONEY ISLAND MORTALLY INJURES A MAN.

Many Knocked Down and Owner, Who Left Rig in Surf Avenue, Is Arrested.

Jacob Wittenstein of No. 19 Union Avenue, Brooklyn, was arraigned in Coney Island police court to-day on a charge of wanton negligence. While the crowd on Surf Avenue was thickest yesterday afternoon Wittenstein left his horse and runaway unattended. The horse ran away.

Thousands of persons were in the way, but they cleared a path for the runaway in the block between Tenth and Eleventh streets. At the Eleventh street corner Frank T. Abbott, twenty-seven, and his wife, Mary, of No. 165 Thirtieth Avenue, Long Island City, did not run fast enough. The runaway pitched Abbott across the avenue and knocked down his wife. Dr. Cavanagh of the Coney Island Hospital found that Abbott had a fractured skull, three broken ribs and internal injuries. His recovery is doubtful.

At Twelfth street the runaway struck Aaron Green, fifty-four, of No. 510 East Sixth street, Manhattan. He required hospital attention, but was not seriously hurt. Six others who were knocked down in the next four blocks refused to go to the hospital, and went home without giving their names. The runaway was stopped at sixteenth street.

A. J. DALY A SUICIDE.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 5.—A. J. Daly, Democratic National Committeeman for Alaska, committed suicide yesterday aboard a river steamer near Tolovana, seventy miles west of here, while en route to the Itard district. He shot himself through the head with a revolver. A coroner's jury at Hot Springs landing found that he was temporarily insane when he killed himself.
