MAY LOSE THEIR LICENSES.

Action Taken Against Places That Disregard Farley's Warning. ALBANY, Sept. 7.—State Excise Commissioner W. W. Farley announced today that proceedings have been instituted against about thirty saloons in New York to revoke their liquor tax certificates because they have violated the law by sale of liquors during prohibited hours.

THIRD RAILS KILL TWO MEN.

Employees of Interboro and B. R. T. Are Shocked to Death. Harry Kuckerack, a car cleaner in the employ of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, walked along the tracks at the Prospect avenue station of the subway yesterday, carrying a tin rail, which struck the third rail. There was a scutter of sparks and Kuckerack fell, shocked to death by electricity. He was twenty-six, and lived at No. 78 Siegel street, Brooklyn.

CREW ATTACKS TWO CUSTOMS INSPECTORS.

Firemen of Principe di Piemonte Object to Search of Ship for Smuggled Goods. Two customs inspectors while searching yesterday afternoon for smuggled goods in the Lloyd Nabaud steamer Principe di Piemonte at her pier in Jersey City were surrounded by the excited crew and almost mobbed. One of the officers was struck and manhandled by a fireman and the other had to draw his revolver for protection.

TRAIN KILLS TRACK WALKER.

His Workmate in Subway, Also Hit, Will Die. James Corbett and Julius Delgenda of No. 23 East One Hundred and Sixth street, track walkers, were run down by a southbound train in the subway near the One Hundred and Twenty-first street and Broadway station shortly before last midnight. Corbett died within a few minutes. His companion has a fractured skull and other injuries, which will cause his death, the doctors at the J. Hood Wright Hospital said.

DR. M'GEE'S BRAIN MORE THAN 49 OUNCES.

Above the Average Weight—His Body to Be Dissected in a Few Days. PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 7.—The body of Dr. W. J. McGee of Washington, who died of cancer on Wednesday, reached Philadelphia Thursday evening and was taken to the Daniel E. Haugh Institute of Anatomy for dissection. The brain of Dr. McGee was removed by Prof. Sptzka and weighs 1.40 grams, or a fraction over forty-nine ounces, which, considering the age of the deceased scientist and the fact that the brain begins to atrophy any time after forty-five years, is regarded as above the average.

Auto Truck Kills Boy.

Gustave Becker, four, of No. 218 Eighth avenue, was run over and instantly killed yesterday afternoon by an auto truck owned and operated by Frederick Miller of Miller & Behrns, No. 278 West One Hundred and Seventeenth street. According to the police the lad caught hold of a chain on the rear of the vehicle, slipped and fell under the truck.

BAD NEWS FOR DEBTORS.

Creditors Can Send Debs on Postal Cards, Says Federal Judge. PITTSBURGH, Sept. 7.—The right of an individual or a corporation to send "postal" cards through the mails in the form of postal cards was upheld here today by Judge Charles P. Orr in the United States District Court. He granted an injunction ordering Postmaster W. H. Davis to deliver certain postal cards bills sent out daily by the Allegheny County Light Company.

SAILOR HELD AS ABDUCTOR.

Hansen Says He Intended Marrying Rita Lawrence. Hans Hansen, a sailor on Cleveland H. Dodge's yacht, Corona, was held without bail yesterday in Westchester Police Court, where he was charged with the abduction of fifteen-year-old Rita Lawrence, daughter of Dr. F. E. Lawrence of City Island. He admitted he was guilty, but said he intended marrying her.
