

BIGGEST THERMOMETER IN WORLD IS INSTALLED FOR PARK ROW CROWDS

It is on World Building and It's Thirteen and One-Fourth Feet High.

The largest thermometer of its type in the world was set into position today on the front of the World Building, where its valuable information can be scanned with ease by the million-odd persons who use the Brooklyn Bridge daily or who journey along the east side of City Hall Park. The thermometer's dimensions are 13 1/4 feet tall and 19 inches wide.

Even the numbers and degrees are huge, varying in size from 4 1/2 to 6 inches, being etched out of a white porcelain back and filled in with a black pigment. The tube itself is filled with a specially prepared spirit which insures rapidity of expansion and contraction. So that one can see the temperature from across Park Row, the tube itself is one foot long, and magnifies the column of spirits from 1-16 of an inch to 5-8 of an inch. It is the largest and heaviest prismatic tube ever made, and nine tubes were sacrificed before the makers got one perfect in giving a straight column, uniform bore and of a size to insure the scale range for this altitude—from 23 degrees below zero to 120 degrees above zero Fahrenheit. It has never been colder than 14 below or warmer than 113 above in the run in New York.

The thermometer proper is covered by the "silent salesman" style of glass case, supplied with a grill work of glass at the bottom and sides to insure perfect circulation of air. Over the top of the immense instrument is placed a copper hood, to protect the scale from snow, ice and dirt flying down into it. Between the hood and the top of the scale is two inches space, which serves to draw the air through the bottom opening of the case, and thus insures a perfect circulation, and correct registration of the temperature in the vicinity of the building.

Eight men, under the supervision of Frank J. Berberick, spent half a day getting the mammoth thermometer into proper position, its base being eight feet from the sidewalk level. It weighs 200 pounds.
