

AGED PARK SHEPHERD AND FAITHFUL COLLIE FIGHT OFF BULLDOG

'Old Jim' and His Pet Nearly Undone in Battle at Sheepfold.

A big white bulldog with an under-shot jaw, trotting through Central park ahead of his owner, a well dressed young man, at seven o'clock today, caught sight of the flock of sheep which were feeding on the lawn under the watchful eye of Jack, Shepherd Jim Conway's collie, who has protected the park flock for fourteen years. The bulldog dashed for the sheep. Jack scurried around to meet him. The bulldog's jaws had gripped the throat of a ewe when Jack reached him. In an instant Jack's long slender jaws were fastened in the assassin's neck. The sheep was released and the two dogs began yelling, snarling and growling and snapping viciously every time a paw, an ear or a tail came within reach of either. Old Conway, who holds Jack, next to the family he has reared at his home, as his most precious possession, ran into the battle with a stout stick. The first blow of the shepherd across the bulldog's thick head, turned the attack on himself. The bull leaped at his face, and falling, leaped again and again at his hands. The old shepherd's kicks were not strong enough to beat him off and there was no room to swing the club. Conway was exhausted and frightened when the young man who owned the dog appeared, took the beast and hurried off out of the park. Old Jim with tears in his eyes and broken voice led Jack to Head Keeper Bill Snyder who is surgeon and trained nurse for all the animals. Jack's right ear had nearly been torn off in the battle and he had many cuts about the throat and body. Five stitches were necessary to save the ear. It is likely that a certain white bulldog will fall a prey to Bill Snyder's trusty rifle if he appears again in the park unleshed.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Sept. 20.—Two men are dead and five others dying in the Cambria Steel Company's hospital here as a result of an explosion of gas here last evening in blast furnace No. 3 of the Franklin plant of the company. Seventeen men were injured, several being able to go to their homes after first aid treatment. The men killed were: Luis Slavich, twenty-four years old, and John Schuler, forty years old.

Actress Unconscious at London Home and There's Little Hope for Her.

LONDON, Sept. 20.—Little hope is held out to-day for the recovery of Mrs. Pat Campbell, the actress, who is ill at her home in Kensington Square. She was stricken suddenly Sunday. Four specialists who were called in were unable to agree whether or not peritonitis

was the affliction from which she was suffering. Because of this disagreement an immediate operation was deferred. Most of the time this week Mrs. Campbell has been unconscious, although she came out of the coma for a short time Wednesday and was reported slightly better that night. Straw has been placed in the streets near the house and the sign put up: "Don't ring the bell." Mrs. Campbell had expected to appear later in the United States in "Bella Donna," the play in which she made her last appearance. Mrs. Campbell passed a fairly comfortable night. 
