

### IRON LADEN VESSEL HAD SHOCKING TRIP IN ELECTRICAL STORM

Lightning Shattered Mast and  
Current Kept Crew  
Jumping.

Shipper Clark and his crew of the freighter *Desnada* Hall, in port to-day from Mexico, Spain, with a cargo of iron pyrites ore, came ashore a jumpy and well-eyed lot.

The *Desnada* Hall ran into a fierce electrical storm in mid-Atlantic a week ago. Electricity has a particular affection for iron pyrites, according to the skipper, and he began looking for trouble as soon as he saw the black clouds looming up. He was not disappointed.

The storm cracked and banged away all about them, the decks one second silent under the glare of savage blue white flashes and the next inky dark. Little tongues of fire began playing about the rigging and the masts at the tip of the bowsprit—the St. Elmo's fire of tales of the sea.

Then, after an hour or more, bang! crash! and a mighty bolt hit the mainmast. The ship shook and shivered. The mast was splintered into kindling from the tip to the deck and bits of it were blown from one end of the ship to the other and littered the heaving seas alongside.

The captain stood on lip of the bridge, not caring for the tangles which came from the handrails. But he did not escape unscathed, for what he called "a young hail" jumped for his beloved old clay pipe and flicked the bowl from the stem so sharply that it went overboard into the foaming seas.

### ARRAIGN "ROBBER" VICTIM.

Jeweller is Charged With Taking  
Gems He Said Bandits Got.

George Richmann, the second avenue jeweller who, a short time ago, began to print as the victim of a taxicab bandit bound-and-gagged-and-threatened-with-guns-and-robbed hold-up in his store, was arraigned before Magistrate Green in the Tombs Police Court to-day, charged with the larceny of \$100 worth of diamonds from Solomon Silberfeld of No. 32 Mulden Lane. A few days ago Richmann was arrested on a charge of conversion.

The complainant alleges that Richmann bought the gems on memorandum when he had only \$4 in the bank. No robbers, aliases Silberfeld, robbed Richmann, but Richmann robbed Silberfeld. The prisoner was committed to the Tombs in default of \$100 bail.

### "FINDINGS KEEPINGS" IDEA SENDS THREE TO PRISON.

Charwoman Who Found Employer's  
Earrings Gave Them to  
Man to Pawn.

When detective arrested Charles Kush of No. 30 East Ninety-third street, in a Tenth avenue pawn shop, where he was trying to pawn a pair of pearl and diamond earrings to-day, Kush said that his friend Francis Perigen of No. 62 West Forty-eighth street had given him the jewels to pawn.

Then Perigen was gathered in and he told a straightforward story about having received the precious baubles from Mrs. Mary Monahan, his mother-in-law, who lives at No. 54 West Forty-fifth street. She had told him that she found them when she was working as charwoman cleaning house for Mrs. Von Herbeck at No. 76 St. Nicholas avenue. The earrings had been lost for more than a year in a dusty corner.

On Mrs. Von Herbeck's complaint Mrs. Monahan and the two men were held in \$100 bail each by Magistrate Krotel in the West Side Court to-day.

### UNION BANK VERY DEAD.

Bank Superintendent's Deputy Pays  
No-Cent Dividend As High.

Deputy Superintendent E. L. Dodge of the State Banking Department, announced to-day that the defunct Union Bank of Brooklyn will not be able to pay 50 cents on the dollar for nearly that amount on claims against it.

Assets of \$90,000 real estate cannot be cleared without the payment of a note for \$20,000 to the Metropolitan Trust Company. Suits against former President David A. Sullivan and directors are regarded as useless.

### AMERICAN MURDERED BY MEXICAN REBELS; HAD MANAGED RANCH

Hubert Russell Was Son of  
Prominent Kansan, Who Has  
Started for Mexico.

WICHITA, Kan., Oct. 2.—A telegram received here from Durango, Mex., announces that Hubert Russell, son of Col. T. A. Russell of Kingman, Kan., was assassinated by Mexican rebels seventy-five miles west of Durango last Sunday. Mr. Russell had been in Mexico managing a large ranch since 1917.

His father is prominent in his part of the State, having been a delegate to the Republican National Convention at St. Louis in 1908. Col. Russell is on his way to Mexico.

A widow and two children of Hubert Russell are now at Kingman, having fled from Mexico at the outbreak of the revolution.

Six men arrested in a raid made last night by Lieut. Conigan and a squad of his men on a house at One Hundred and Twelfth street and Park avenue, were held to-day in the Harlem Court by Magistrate Herrman, for examination Monday. Bail in each case was fixed at \$1,000.

When the prisoners were arraigned, to-day, they asked for an adjournment, which was granted.
