

TURKS IN FURIOUS BATTLE MOW DOWN THE MONTENEGRINS

Sultan's Troops, Reinforced and Entrenched, Pour Deadly Fire on Invaders.

CETTINJE, Montenegro, Oct. 10.—A battle between Montenegrins and Turks was being fought today around Detshitch Mountain and along the Scutari road on the Turkish side of the frontier. The Turks, heavily reinforced overnight, were mowing down the advancing Montenegrins from behind strong intrenchments.

Crown Prince Danilo of Montenegro, in active command, was on the firing line. King Nicholas had general charge of operations from the Montenegrin side of the frontier.

The Turkish general in command at Podgoritz, where fighting began yesterday, committed suicide just before the Montenegrins opened fire because he had received an order from Constantinople giving a more experienced officer precedence over him.

BUDAPEST, Oct. 10.—Following their initial reverse by the Montenegrins at Flanitsina Mountain, the Turks have been putting up a desperate resistance to their enemies' advance into Turkish territory, according to messages from the front today.

The Turks apparently were unprepared for the attack on their Flanitsina position and repelled unsuccessfully the Montenegrin artillery fire. Cannon after cannon was put out of commission, and after thirty minutes' engagement the Turks fell back upon Detshitch Mountain. There their fortifications were much stronger, and throughout the afternoon the Montenegrins were held back by a hailstorm of rifle and military shots.

During the afternoon and last night Turkish troops, arriving from the southwest, were constantly landing on the shore of Lake Scutari, near the Montenegrin frontier, and at dawn today a heavy fire was resumed on the Montenegrin lines. The latter replied briskly and at last accounts the engagement was still in progress along an extended front.

Nothing is yet known here of the extent either of the Turkish or Montenegrin losses, but all reports indicate that they have been heavy. Messages, it was said, were constantly passing between King Nicholas of Montenegro, at headquarters in the rear, and his son, Crown Prince Danilo, who is in active command at the front. His younger brother, Prince Peter, is an artillery captain under him.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 10.—Strife-ridden fighting occurred between Turks and Bulgarians today in the vicinity of Klisura and Tunbush, on the frontier. Details are lacking.

The Ambassadors of the European powers today presented to the Turkish government a collective note urging the importance of immediate reforms in Turkey's European provinces.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Bulgaria and Serbia were expected to present ultimatums to Turkey today, according to advices from Constantinople. Despite yesterday's reports, they have not definitely broken off diplomatic relations with the Sultan, but it is expected momentarily that they will do so.

MAY GET OFF EASY IF SHE SAYS WHERE THAT \$150,000 IS

But Rosa Zindel Is Defiant, Though Judge Suggests He'll Be Lenient.

If Miss Rosa Zindel, whose spectacular business career came to smash several months ago when she was arrested for forgery, will disclose every dollar she has, every diamond and pearl she owns, every picture and work of art in her possession and all other property to which she lays claim, Supreme Court Justice Blanchard says he will consider a plea for clemency in her behalf when he imposes sentence.

Miss Zindel, a large woman, attired in a black tailored suit and a large hat with long black feathers, was brought before Justice Blanchard today to be sentenced. She pleaded guilty on Monday to forgery in the second degree. The forged document was a note that purported to have been signed by a Philadelphia business firm, Miss Zindel had discounted it at the Century Bank.

The prisoner, whose business operations, culminating in the organization of the Zindel Manufacturing Company, had been the wonder of financiers, showed plainly the effect of the nervous strain she was under when she stood before the bench today. George Gordon Battle, her lawyer, beside her, frequently she placed a vial of smelling salts to her nostrils. One moment her face would be colorless; the next it would flush a deep red.

Mr. Battle made a plea for mercy on the ground of his client's physical condition. "I have been hounded and lied about," cried Miss Zindel. "There has been a concerted attempt to ruin me."

Behind her were creditors of hers and of the Zindel Manufacturing Company, which made tortoise shell goods. Their spokesman was Jesse Epstein, attorney for the Century Bank.

"Within thirty days before the petition in bankruptcy was filed against this woman she got hold of \$150,000, for which no satisfactory account ever has been given," said Mr. Epstein. "She merely says that books will show the money was all lost."

Miss Zindel darted an angry glance at the lawyer. "The books do show it," she shouted. "I filed the petition against her on behalf of my clients," continued the lawyer. "I caused a receiver to be placed in charge of her business and of her apartment on Madison avenue. He took an inventory of the household furnishings of the apartment and left her as a custodian. Later a lot of the furnishings disappeared and were found in a vacant flat on another floor."

"About \$2,000 worth of lace curtains and certain pictures have disappeared altogether. She says the receiver—an officer of court—took them. That is absurd."

"It's true," retorted Miss Zindel. "Your Honor," resumed the lawyer, "the receiver found among her effects a card index. It showed her forgery

ITALIANS DEFEAT TURKS. Rome Gets News of Fight Which Sultan's Men Lose Navily.

ROME, Oct. 10.—Italian troops under Gen. Reissol occupied advanced positions west of Derma last night after an all-day battle with the Turks and Arabs, according to messages received today from Tripoli. The Turkish and Arabian forces lost heavily. Gen. Reissol's report said: the Italians only a few men killed and wounded.

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
