

M'INTYRE ANGRY AT REPORT HE HAD QUIT BECKER CASE

Calls the Circulation of Story a "Piece of Underhand Sneaking Work."

IS STILL IN CHARGE.

Joseph A. Shay, Retained as Attorney of Record, Will Prepare Brief.

John F. McIntyre, who is at a seaside resort near New York recuperating from the strain of his work in the Becker trial, sent over the long-distance telephone to-day a positive denial that he is out of the Becker case. He was particularly emphatic in denouncing a report that he had retired from the case because he had become convinced of Becker's guilt.

"I am still in charge of the Becker defense. I left the city after the trial by order of my physician. I expect to return on Monday, when I shall take up the work of preparing the appeal. The reports that I was out of the case did not come from me or anybody connected with me, or from the Becker family. They came from a hostile source, and I was not consulted before they were printed. This is in keeping with everything connected with the conspiracy by which Becker was railroaded to Sing Sing."

Announcement was made to-day that Joseph A. Shay, a lawyer with offices in the suite occupied by John F. McIntyre in the Broad Exchange Building, was retained three days ago to act as attorney of record for Charles Becker. John W. Hart, who had been attorney of record since Becker's arrest, is no longer associated with the defense. He did not withdraw, but his connection ceased automatically immediately after Becker had been sentenced on last Wednesday.

Mr. Shay was associated with John F. McIntyre, senior counsel for the defense in the Thornton Hains case. It was Mr. Hains who was indicted with his brother, Capt. Hains, for the murder of William Annis. Thornton Hains was acquitted.

APPEAL BASED ON NOVEL LINES IN HOMICIDE CASE. According to Lawyer Shay the appeal in the Becker case will be based on lines unusual in a homicide proceeding. Shay expects to establish, by means of new evidence and comparisons of old evidence, that Becker is the victim of a conspiracy.

The Thornton Hains case was much like the Becker case from a legal standpoint. Thornton Hains did not actually shoot Annis, but he was indicted for first degree murder on the ground that he persuaded his brother to commit the murder. In the Thornton Hains case it was submitted in evidence that Thornton accompanied his brother to the Haystack Yacht Club and stood alongside him as the shots which killed Annis were fired and kept back people who would have interfered and still the jury acquitted Thornton Hains.

"Without my retention, three days ago, as the attorney of record in the Becker case, I have been at work day and night going over the transcript of evidence," said Mr. Shay to a reporter for The Evening World. "There are some 4,000 pages of the trial and these are ransomed with exceptions and reversible errors, both in the matter of the evidence placed before the jury by the District-Attorney and in the charge of the Court. There is no doubt in my mind that many of these errors are of a nature that will assure the reversal of the verdict which has sent Becker to the death house in Sing Sing."

HOPE TO BREAK DOWN TESTIMONY OF ACCOMPLICES. "As has been brought out before, the law says plainly that a conviction cannot be obtained on the evidence of accomplices in a crime unless supported by the evidence of disinterested witnesses. Becker was convicted on the testimony of three acknowledged accomplices in the murder of Herman Rosenthal, one man whom we mean to prove was an accomplice and two others whose testimony there will be no difficulty in refuting.



GREEK SOLDIERS OFF TO WAR SHIP AS CARGO.

Twenty-six hundred Greeks boarded the French liner Niagara to-day and sailed away to the land of Homer, prying that they would arrive in time to gird on their swords and wage war with the crumbling Turk. They went aboard and singing their psalm. There was such a jam of Spaniards and Legionnaires for the Niagara's passenger list that the ship could not carry a cargo.

200 BURNED TO DEATH BY TURKISH TROOPS.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Nov. 2.—Before evacuating Bunarhisar the Turkish troops shot up two hundred Bulgarians in the barracks and set fire to the building, according to the newspaper Mir. All the Bulgarians perished. According to the same newspaper, are also massacring Bulgarian residents in the Struma Valley.

DEMOCRATIC BALL OFF.

CARLOADS OF WOUNDED FROM BULGAR'S RANKS.

SOFIA, Nov. 2.—Carload after carload of wounded rolled into Sofia to-day from the front. The ferocity of the fighting between the Bulgarians and Turks was easy to imagine from the nature of the victim's wounds. The bayonet and the knife have figured extensively in the struggle across the frontier. Gunshot wounds were to be expected, as the German surgeon who volunteered his services for hospital work here remarked, but the use of cold steel, he said, he had supposed was a century out of date in modern warfare.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN MASSACRED BY TURKS

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Nov. 1.—Bulgarian reports say that the Turkish troops during their retreat from Eski-Baba to Lule Bugas massacred two hundred women and children in the village of Atval. A number of the victims were still in their death agonies when the Bulgarian troops entered the place.

SERVIANS RUSH ON TO JOIN GREEKS.

BELGRADE, Nov. 1.—The Servians were pushing their advance on Monastir to-day to join the Greeks in a siege of the city. A hard fight was anticipated with Zeczi Pasha's forces, but complete confidence was expressed that the combined Servians and Greeks will win. Sutarai, according to news from Cetinje, was still holding out to-day.

FATE OF AMERICANS IN MISSING BALLOON IS STILL A PROBLEM


Anxiety Among Aeronauts, Who Think Two Airmen May Have Landed in Lapland.
