CROWDS WATCH SIEGE.

Special Police May Be Ordered
to Keep Fifth Avenue
Traffic Open.

In momentary anticipation of orders from the House of Representatives to arrest William Rockefeller and take him to Washington, Sergeant-at-Arms Riddell and his eighty assistants tightened the guard around the Rockefeller home at the northeast corner of Fifty-fourth street and Fifth avenue this afternoon.

BIG CROWDS OUT TO SEE THE BESIEGING ARMY.

All New York is beginning to gravitate toward the Rockefeller corner where a Standard Oil millionaire is being held in the house, will try to escape when he hears that the House of Representatives, irritated at his long contempt for a subpoena issued by that body, may take summary measures.

Mr. Riddell's men, working in relays, are dividing their time between the Rockefeller home and the Hotel Marlborough, where they are lodged. Besides the guard of Government subpoena servers outside the house there are private detectives in the care of Mr. Riddell, and in the Rockefeller mansion and grounds there are Pinkerton sleuths on guard—at least this latter information is circulated among the watchers.

That the murder and suicide was unpremeditated was brought out in the inquiry instituted by Coroner Moore and Assistant District-Attorney Leroy M. Young, when it was found that last night Edey had ordered a rig from the local livery stable to take him to the 8 o'clock train this morning. Edey and his wife were seen together at the Bellport post-office last night.
